TWO MEN FOR EACH POSITION IS BUSS PLAN

De Pauw Coach Coming to Indianapolis With Plenty of Talent for Centre Fray.

STUDENTS TUNE YELLS

GREENCASTLE, Ind., Nov. 4.—With "get Centre next" as their slogan, members of the De Pauw football team went through their last hard session in preparation for the Centre game Wednesday afternoon at McKeen Field. A win there showed determination to give the Colonels the fight of their lives at Washington Park, Indianapolis, Saturday afternoon.

Regulars of the De Pauw squad were matched against a scrub team in the final practice of the year. The scrub team, of some Centre players, had been availed nothing against the fighting varsity team, which was keyed up to the last notch. New plays, which have been introduced this week, were put over perfectly by the regulars during the afternoon. The improved condition of McKeen Field, due to the favorable change in the weather, helped materially in the practice.

CRYPPLE IN SQUAD.

During the final practices, only short signal drills will be held along with training in running down under punts and catching forward passes. De Pauw has 10 players on the bench, having some of his men injured in last-minute scrimmages. To date, all members of the squad, with the exception of "Babe" Bryan, have received an injured knee in Tuesday's practice which probably will keep him out of the game Saturday. He has been playing in the line in recent scrimmages.

Coach Buss has developed several good men for each position during the season which will stand him in good stead in case of any possible players who can fill any one of several positions.

As the time for the game draws near, it is planned to have "pep" tests on the De Pauw team to make sure that the Gold students for the great tilt.
