

## CHURCH TO GIVE 2-DAY PAGEANT

Depicts Story of Nations  
Without Christ.

"The Light of the World," a pageant depicting the story of the nations of the world without Christ, the coming of the prophet and the transformation will be presented Thursday and Friday evenings at the East Tenth Street M. E. Church under the auspices of the Rev. George S. Henninger, pastor, for the purpose of illustrating the disposition of the \$120,000,000 raised by the Methodist churches of the United States for the centenary fund.

Franklin D. Leete, bishop of the Indiana area of the Methodist Church, will deliver an address upon missionary work at the church tonight.

The cast of the pageant includes the prophet who predicts the future of the church, the church, the American citizens, the American soldiers and the following non-Christian countries, each of whom appeals for life: Africa, Turkey, India, China, Japan and Pacific Islands, South America.

There also will be booths of each missionary field in which hostesses in native costumes will preside. Mrs. Helen Lynn will preside in the Chinese booth, and Mrs. W. F. Walker, a returned missionary from China, will tell her experiences in missionary work in China at the visit.

Mrs. H. C. Phillmann will occupy the booth of India, and Mrs. Paul Millholland, a returned missionary from India, will be in the booth. Mrs. Charles Coleman will have charge of the Korean booth. In the African booth an African quartette will give selections, and Mrs. Alta Balay will be the hostess. Mrs. John T. Rubush will be in the American city booth. Mrs. L. M. Elder, in the American Indian booth will be assisted by Mrs. Clyde Titus, soloist. A Mexican quartette will furnish entertainment in the

the Mexican booth, in which Mrs. Edward Hughes will preside.

Each booth will contain curios of the country. Tea will be served in Japan, rice in China, and chili in Mexico. The pageant is open to the public without charge, beginning at 7 o'clock each evening.

## FARM OFFICIAL ON TAX BOARD

John Brown of Rockport New  
State Commissioner.

John J. Brown, Rockport, and Philip Zoercher, Indianapolis, have been appointed members of the State Board of Tax Commissioners. Mr. Brown succeeds Strange N. Cragun, Republican member of the board, whose term expires Dec. 4, while Mr. Zoercher will succeed himself, his term having expired some time ago. The commissions of both appointees will be dated Dec. 1.

Mr. Brown is a farmer and attorney of Rockport, Spencer County, and is vice president of the Indiana Federation of Farmers' Associations. He is president of the Brown Trust Company of Rockport and a member of the Spencer County Bar Association.

His appointment was made with the approval of Governor-elect Warren T. McCray, in keeping with one of his campaign pledges that a farmer would be represented on the State Tax Board.

Mr. Zoercher is the Democratic member of the board and was first appointed

in 1918. He served as reporter of the Supreme Court from 1913 to 1917, being defeated for re-election in 1919.

Fred A. Sims, Republican, chairman, is the third member of the board. His term will expire Sept. 1, 1921.

The appointments to the tax board are the most important appointments made by Governor Goodrich in the remaining months of his term as executive.

Mr. Cragun plans to spend several months in the Philippines when he retires from the tax board. It will be his first vacation since assuming the duties of tax commissioner, four years ago.
