

FIRST 'EVENING' CONCERT PLEASES
Marcosson Trio Heard by Jewish Council.

As the opening feature of a series of "evenings" to be presented by the educational section of the Council of Jewish Women, the Marcosson Concert Company appeared in recital at the temple last night. The company is composed of Sol Marcosson, violinist; Mrs. Dorothy Frew Marcosson, pianist, and Sara Re Qua Vick, contralto.

Mr. and Mrs. Marcosson opened the program with an arrangement of Greig's "Sonata in G, Opus 13," which was Mrs. Marcosson's opportunity to exhibit her evident skill as a soloist.

Mr. Marcosson played with technical beauty, but seemed to lack that intangible something that might be called "musical sympathy."

His second number was the "Romance and Finale Alla Zingara from Concerto in D Minor" (Wolff) which he and his dual group introduced "Dance River" (Coleridge-Taylor), "La Götter," "Caprice Viennois" (Kreisler), "Oriental" (Cui), and "Etude in E Major" (Paganini). The Kreisler "Caprice" and the Cui number were evidently favorites of the audience, judging from the spontaneous outburst of applause following them. He responded with "Vivace" as his first number the and "O Don Fatale" (Verdi). She has a contralto voice of rich, smooth quality and of unusual range. Her group of lighter songs was delightfully interpreted. They included "Sink, Red Sun" (Del Riego), "A Birthday" (Cowen), "My Heart's Desire" and "Lily Thine Eyes" (Frederick Knight Logan). As an encore he gave a little song called "A Dream."

As a finale the trio gave "By the Waters of Minnetonka" (Liszt), arranged for voice, with a violin obligato.

MY HUSBAND'S FAVORITE RECIPE

WALNUT CAKE.
Ingredients—Two eggs, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of butter, 1 cup of sugar, 1 teaspoonful of vanilla, 2 cups of flour, 1 cup of milk, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoonful of salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of walnuts chopped fine and 3 teaspoonfuls of baking powder.

Beat the cream butter and sugar, add beaten eggs. Then add the flour in which the baking powder has been sifted a little at a time. Add the salt. Beat well. Lastly add the walnuts and the flavoring. Bake in two greased cake pans.

Ingredients for frosting: One-half cup of granulated sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of water, whites of 2 eggs. Boil the sugar and water until a soft ball is formed in cold water. Then beat in the whites of the eggs gradually. Chopped walnut meats may be added if desired.

2. To test a roasted or baked chicken or turkey to tell when it is done, insert a fork in the wing, which is supposed to be the toughest part of the fowl. If the fork turns easily, the fowl is done.

3. To remedy binding or scraping a door, take the door off the hinges and place a little of the wax where the scraping takes place. Don't do this until furnace heat is on, as many doors are expanded by the dampness of summer but shrink to normal when the heat is on.
