

RIVALRY GAMES AND TITLE BATTLES PUT FOOTBALL FANS ON EDGE FOR RARE TREATS

BANNER GAMES COUNTRY OVER THIS SATURDAY

Grid Contests East, West and South Tomorrow All of Crucial Brand.

HOW TEAMS STACK UP

More than a score of the country's biggest football elevens will swing into action in important games tomorrow. The last big Saturday schedule of a banner season is studded with attractive contests, every one of which will be witnessed by enormous crowds.

The shrill blast of the referee's whistle will set Yale and Harvard in motion at New Haven, Conn., in the biggest eastern game of the day, with a crowd of 80,000 persons looking on.

Harvard is a strong favorite to win, but Yale supporters are confident that the Crimson team will keep its nose to the football line before twilight shadows start playing around the big bowl.

The championship of the "Big Ten" will hang in the balance when Ohio State and Illinois clash at Urbana.

In addition to these games the contests between Dartmouth and Brown at Boston, Cornell and Michigan at Ithaca, Cornell vs. Notre Dame, Northwestern at Evanston, Nebraska and the Michigan Aggies at Lincoln, Purdue and Indiana at Lafayette, Wabash and DePauw at the Polo Grounds, and Cornell at St. Louis, and Columbia and Pennsylvania at the Polo Grounds, New York, will be watched with the keenest interest.

The performances of the big boys for all-American honors this fall will attract much interest as the outcome of the various games and, all in all, it looks like the banner year.

The Harvard clash will be the thirty-ninth between these teams. The Blue and Crimson first met on the football gridiron in 1892, and the record shows that Harvard has a mighty power in the football world, has twenty-three victories to her credit out of this number, Harvard has beaten Yale only ten times, and the same is true of Cornell.

From all indications Harvard will chalk up her eleventh victory on the Blue of Yale tomorrow, though many critics think that the Crimson can detect a bulldog by the convincing margin that Princeton piled up.

In Boston tomorrow two games of unusual interest will be played when Dartmouth vs. Brown and Boston College takes on Marquette. The last mentioned team is coached by Earl Neale, elder of the Crimson Birds. It is in the "big ten" of 1920" because of its fine playing. The Michigan Aggies are second Maletta's victims.

Georgetown and Washington and Lee in the South will have a battle in the South tomorrow, as Georgia's Tech is idle and Centre has a cup in Virginia. The feature attraction of the Pacific coast is the battle between California and Stanford University.
