

CHARGES BOOZE  
GANG WITH CRIME  
Blackford County Official Be-  
lieves Frazier Murdered.

HARTFORD CITY, Ind., Dec. 10.—That William Frazier, former tenant on the Merritt Chapman farm, east of the city, where the body of a man was found in the ruins of a dwelling which burned last Friday, was murdered by the members of a hoodlum gang, is the belief of one Blackford County official who is taking an active part in the investigation.

This officer, whose name is withheld, has returned from a trip to Greenville, Ohio; Muncie, Portland, Redkey, Ridgeville and Dunkirk, where he investigated the affair.

According to this officer he secured evidence to show that members of the alleged gang, of which Frazier is said to have been a member, feared he would be arrested on a charge of forgery and would tell of the gang's operations.

Farmers in the vicinity of Frazier's former home report that several deacons have been sent to sell liquor to them. Frazier is said to have passed several forged checks at Muncie and the police there were preparing to arrest him when the fire occurred and he disappeared.

Peru Woman Wishes Boy  
Home to Aid in Filling  
Family Larder.

"We'd like to have Omer home for  
Christmas. The little fellow don't really  
know where he is, and it will be a pretty  
poor Christmas at our house without  
him."

This parting plea was made to the State Board of Pardons by Mrs. Clara Siegfried of Peru, mother of Omer D. Siegfried, 21, who is confined in the Indiana Reformatory on a charge of steeling \$1,000 in silver dollars from a jeweler. Siegfried was a clerk for the Wabash Railroad at Peru.

Mrs. Siegfried, who made the trip to Indianapolis at a sacrifice of the money needed to keep the family landed stocked up, pleaded that her son was an only child, can, for his own freedom. She said her boy was not a criminal at heart, and that it was due to bad company and evil influences that led him to commit the crime.

Mrs. Siegfried told the board of pardons that she was working in a basket factory in Peru to keep the family in food. Her husband, who is aged and an invalid, is not able to work and she told the board she wished her son back to aid in keeping the family.

Verner Davidson, a Peru taxi driver, who was implicated in the theft for which Siegfried is doing time, is also asking a parole.

Leroy Arnold, prosecutor of Miami County, in a letter to the board, asked the same consideration for Davidson, which the board might extend Siegfried.




