42,994 HURT
IN INDUSTRIES

7,762 More Injured in 1920 Than in 1919.

Industrial accidents in Indiana in 1920 increased by more than 7,000 over the number in 1919, according to a report of the Indiana industrial board, for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30. The report shows that 42,994 persons were injured in the past year, an increase of 7,762 over last year.

Of the total number of accidents, 291 resulted fatally while 919 resulted in dismemberments. An estimate of Edward J. Bolesman, secretary of the board, states that approximately 80 per cent of the persons killed left families entirely dependent on them for support.

Accidents in the coal industry, which was under the direction of the industrial board for the first full year in 1920, totaled 433, seventy-eight of which resulted fatally. Falling material caused the highest number of injuries, 6,204 being injured in this manner. Injuries to the eye, ranked second, with 3,922.

A table compiled by Mr. Bolesman shows the steady increase in wages of the workmen, from Oct., 1919, to Sept., 30, 1920. The table follows:

More than \$1,000,000 was paid out as compensation to injured workmen, an increase of approximately \$100,000 over the sum paid in the preceding year.

Vicksburg Heroes

The War Department at Washington has requested the members of the board of county commissioners to use their influence in getting an appropriation measure passed by the next State Legislature for a State memorial on Indiana Circle in the Vicksburg National Military Park, for the purpose of honoring the deeds of Indiana soldiers at the siege of Vicksburg.

The Government has placed nine bronze portraits of Indiana generals in the memorial cemetery.

The commissioners will investigate the request of the War Department before making a recommendation, it was announced.

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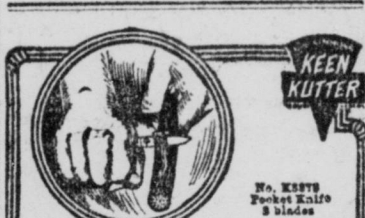
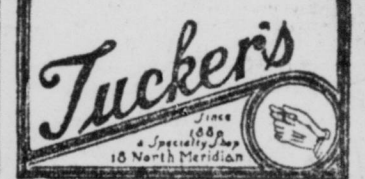
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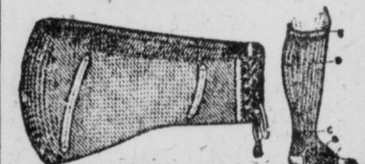
