ANSWERS TO YESTERDAY'S QUESTIONS.

1. The original graham bread differed from the present so-called graham bread in that it contained no yeast or other leavening agent.
2. To make good chicken or turkey gravy, remove the bird from the roasting pan, pour off most of the fat, and add four level tablespoons of flour. Mix well. Add two cups of water, salt, pepper and cook five minutes, stirring briskly.
3. When removing spots and stains it is best to scratch fabric over a small bowl and apply Javelle water or other strong chemical with a medicine dropper.




