Shorn of Much Gilt Under New Promoting Terms.

QUEBEC OFFICIAL KICKS.
QUEBEC, Feb. 1.—Violations of the law prohibiting boxing bouts in the province will not concern the Dempsey Attorney General Lancot said today in discussing proposals to hold the Dempsey-Carpentier championship bout in Montreal.

Replies to a suggestion that an order in council could be passed giving special permission for holding the matches, he said orders in council derogatory to the law are unconstitutional.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—Jack Dempsey has agreed to defend his world's championship against George Carpentier on a percentage basis for Tex Rickard. Carpenter has been asked by cable to agree to a like proposition and is expected to accept.

Meanwhile Rickard is today sole proprietor of the big bout, and according to present plans he will promote it by himself.

After ushering January out with a series of controversial arrangements were made by the aggressive promoter, who has completed arrangements to take over the interests of Messrs. Brady and Cochran.

KEARNS' ACTION HELPS MATTER.

Jack Kearns' action in meeting Rickard half way in the matter of Dempsey's end of the purse means that the champion of his challenger stand a better chance of getting together than they ever have before.

Undoubtedly Rickard has agreed to a guarantee Dempsey a certain sum with a private understanding.

The same sort of an offer has been made to Carpenter and the total guarantee is smaller by many thousands than the original purse of \$60,000. Rickard, however, will not let other interested parties know the size of guarantees a secret for obvious reasons.

For the present, at least, there will be no changes in plans called for under the original contract for staging the bout. Rickard has until March 1 to name a site for staging the big bout at any time between January 29 and July 2 and he confidently expects to select a site within thirty days.

If the syndicate represented by Charles Grauman of Los Angeles can secure official permission to stage the fight in Canada there is little doubt that Rickard will come to some agreement with the Eastern Canada Securities, Ltd.

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BOSTON, Feb. 1.—Ed (catch-as-catch-can) wrestling, threw Renato Galdi, Italian heavyweight, here last night. Galdi, 180 pounds, will meet the champion of the A. U. U. card, which will be held for unattached athletes who do not hold A. U. U. cards, a registration fee of 50 cents, will be charged. Trials of White Sox Not Being Delayed, Attorney Announces

Crowe Denies Rumors That Scandal Players Would Not Be Prosecuted.

CHICAGO, Feb. 1.—Vigorous denial of reports that the Chicago White Sox players in the recent gamblers' imbroglio will fail to consent to "throw" the 1920 world's series to Cincinnati would not be brought to trial if made here by State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe.

"There never has been any such thought in my mind," Crowe declared.

"State's attorney of State's attorney has done everything that I could bring about a hearing of the case within sixty days," said Crowe, "and it is the opinion of the state's attorney that the prosecution of the case, at least on the advisability of rushing the trial of the gamblers, would be brought to trial if made here by State's Attorney Robert E.
