Draws Attention in Tiger Case and Lands in Cell.

When Nathan Bowman, 66, 1633 As-
land avenue, appeared at police head-
quarters a few days ago and signed a
\$2,500 bond for Samuel J. Barnett,
charged with operating a blind tiger, he
attracted unfortunate attention. He was
arrested the next day on a charge of
operating a blind tiger when police found five
barrels containing 250 gallons of white
mule whisky in his home. The car con-
taining half a gallon of the liquor was
found in his automobile.

Barnett was taken last week in a
hombre at 632 East Fifteenth street, in
which house the police found 206 gallons
of white mule whisky, a still with a fire
under it, and a large supply of white police
are fake revenue stamps.

After Bowman signed Barnett's bond
Lieutenant Sergeant Sheridan and a
squad searched Bowman's home. Bow-
man was released on bond, but was re-
quested for investigation of case by
Federal authorities. He is held without
bond.

The United States marshal opened for business today two men appeared and said they wanted to go on Bowman's bond, and also requested permits to leave at the county jail. They seemed greatly surprised to learn that he had not been arrested by Federal officers and that there was no charge against him in Federal Court.
