COLUMBUS, Ind., April 1.—Ernest L. Lambert, 40, postmaster of Hope, is dead at the Bartholomew County Hospital here of heart trouble, of which he had been ill only a few days. Mr. Lambert had undergone an operation at the hospital and was recovering when heart trouble developed.

Mr. Lambert was a life-long resident of the county, being born near Hope. After graduating from Indiana University, he taught school in the county for a number of years. He was engaged in the grocery business at Hope when appointed postmaster by President Wilson last July. Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Hope Methodist Church and burial will be in the Moravian Cemetery. The widow and one daughter, Mrs. Edith Rich of Long Beach, Calif., survive.
