

THOMAS MADE DEBUT IN DRAMA

Now He Is a Baritone With 'Apple Blossoms'

John Charles Thomas, the baritone who will sing an important role in "Apple Blossoms," which opens Thursday at English's, made his stage debut with "Everywoman," the morality play.

He has achieved success on the concert platform and has appeared with Galli-Curci, John McCormack, Alma Gluck and Louis Gravenor.

His recitals in Aeolian Hall, New York, last season and Jordan Hall, Boston, were brilliant successes, definitely establishing the young baritone in the front rank of American concert artists. This was followed by equally popular appearances in other cities, and Mr. Thomas had about made up his mind to desert musical comedy, in which he had first made his reputation, for a concert career, with grand opera hovering somewhere in the background, when he was persuaded to postpone his plans in favor of the Kreiser-Jacobi-Le Baron operetta, which scored such a notable hit at the Globe Theater in New York.

Mr. Thomas is a graduate of the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore and was a favorite soloist at St. Michael's and All Angels Church and the Brown Memorial Presbyterian Church of that city. He is the son of the Rev. Milton Thomas.

He left Baltimore to obtain dramatic experience and first appeared as Passion in "Everywoman."

Then came a somewhat strenuous season as a blacksmith, a policeman and an Indian in musical revues.

This was followed by a season in "The Peasant Girl," after which Mr. Thomas returned to the musical stage. "Along at Last," "Her Soldier Boy" and an all-star revival of the "Highwayman" saw the young singer steadily gaining in prestige until he was finally established in a leading role in "Maytime," in which he played for nearly two years.

AIR HOTEL ROW IN CITY COURT

Manager of Claypool Cleared of Assault Charge.

Henry Lawrence, general manager of the Claypool Hotel, was freed of charges of assault and battery preferred by Stewart Donnelly, hotel hanger-on, in city court yesterday afternoon by Judge Walter Pritchard. The case of assault and battery against Donnelly was taken under advisement for a month by the judge.

The police said Lawrence had ordered Donnelly out of the hotel after, he said, he had received information that Donnelly was engaged in the "bootlegging business." The police said that Donnelly refused to leave and caused a "scene" in the lobby in which Mr. Lawrence's eyeglasses were jarred off, Judge Pritchard made a ruling that Donnelly was not to enter the Claypool Hotel hereafter. He said the only persons the establishment was forced to accommodate were transients and that Donnelly was a resident of this city.

RUMORED WHEAT STRIKE DENIED

Acreage in Northwest to Equal Last Year, Say Specialists.

ST. PAUL, April 6.—There is no wheat strike in the Northwest. Farm specialists here today said all indications are the wheat and small grain acreage in the Northwest will be approximately the same as last year. Twenty to thirty per cent of the wheat crop is already in, they said.

"The only way the farmer can strike is with the hoe," said Prof. Andrew Ross, agronomist of the State University farm.

"There was some pessimism last fall when prices were falling but I believe the farmers have come to realize that they must make the best of the situation. At this time of the year the farmer begins to figure that he isn't going to get any more out of his farm than he put in the ground and acts accordingly. That's all he can do."
