

STATE FORESTER URGES SCHOOL TREE PLANTING

Says Purpose of Arbor Day to
Inculcate Knowledge and
Love of Nature.

PROGRAM IS SUGGESTED

The planting of trees on Arbor day, Friday, April 15, this year, aside from an aesthetic view, has great economic value by reason of the merchantable timber possible later on, says Charles J. Dean, forester under the State department of conservation, who appeals to all citizens, especially school children, to observe Arbor day of 1921 by an extensive tree planting program.

The spirit of Arbor day, as conceived by its founders, was to inculcate in youth a love and knowledge of trees. This work rightfully belongs in the schools of the land, and in a bulletin the State forester urges that pupils gather en masse on this day and observe it generally throughout Indiana.

Mr. Dean suggests that schools arrange a program in advance, decide on the number of trees to be planted and where, and the trees should be heeled in and on the ground ready for planting on the day of the exercises. He points out that it is unnecessary to confine Arbor day plantings to the school grounds. In some instances no room is available. However, there are plenty of places in need of trees, and in the country privileges can easily be secured to plant trees about churches, cemeteries, along roadsides, and especially roadsides paralleling streams where they are a source of beauty and comfort. In the cities it is suggested they be planted along streets, about churches and in parks and contiguous to public buildings.

PLANT TREES AT HOME.

In addition to universal planting by school, each pupil should be encouraged to plant one or more trees at home. The pupil can call it his or her tree, or plant it in honor of a new born or in commemoration of a deceased friend or relative. Then a personal and aesthetic reason prompts the child to watch the tree

COBBLER MEETS WATERLOO IN HARDING SHOES

Says President Wished Re-
pairs Made in Impossible
Way.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—A pair of shoes worn by the president of the United States meant nothing in the life of F. Summer. Positively not, Summer emphasized.

He made a statement to this effect as he stood in his little, but busy, shoe repairing shop, a square away from the White House after the sensational fact had become known that he had declined to fix President Harding's golf shoes.

He is the first shoemaker in the history of the nation to "turn down a president."

Although not officially designated as such, he may be called "shoemaker extraordinary" to the White House. He has repaired the shoes which have about presidential feet since Cleveland's term.

"I have no objection to repairing Mr. Harding's shoes and any one else's," said Mr. Summer, "but Mr. Harding wanted his golf shoes fixed in an impossible way."

There was a pause and then Summer, who is a swarthy complexioned little man with a moustache like H. G. Wells', said rather fiercely: "I can't do the impossible for the President of the United States or Babe Ruth."

"Presidents are nice folks, all right, but as customers they are no different to me than any one else," Mr. Summer continued.

He disclosed the following facts to be recorded for posterity:

President Harding has the biggest foot of any of the seven Presidents who have patronized Summer, beginning with Grover Cleveland.

"His foot's the longest and Tat's the widest," said Summer, by way of explanation.

Also his shoes are the "nicest." Roosevelt was the hardest on shoes.

All of Mr. Harding's six immediate predecessors in the White House, "ran down" their heels.

all through life and take added interest in its welfare.

While the planting of trees for many years was considered only from a cultural standpoint, today such work has great economic aspect in view of the de-

pleted timber stocks of the nation and particularly in Indiana where the bulk of timber used is imported.

The commercial aspect looms big when one considers that if each of 500,000 school children would plant one tree and all these trees lived to maturity, the lumber these trees would produce in later years would have a market value of at least \$3,000,000. It should be remembered also that during the lives of the trees they would be constantly a source of comfort and benefit.

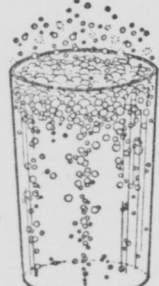
CAREFUL SELECTION IS IMPORTANT.

In planting trees great care should be exercised to select trees that are long lived, free of insect enemies and disease and that possess a high commercial value.

Of the shade tree type, the sugar and black maple are among the best. In addition the sycamore, pin and white oak may be used. Away from the smoke and heat, especially the heat arising from paved streets of cities, the tulip, white ash, linn, oaks, white and red elm, black

walnut, and sweet gum in southern Indiana should be first choice.

Sugar and black maple are adaptable to any portion of Indiana, and where a small, round-topped tree is desired, the Norway maple is given preference.

After the trees are planted they should be protected and mulched. When planted the lower branches should be pruned off, or all or most of the side branches cut back. Never top a tree at planting, warns the State forester. In the event the tree is too spindling it may be cut

back but not further than where the diameter is less than one-half inch. Small trees at planting should be supported by a stake driven alongside.
