

HOUGH TO TAKE OFFICE AT ONCE

Appointed to Succeed Sims on State Tax Board.

William A. Hough, Republican, Greenfield, who has been appointed a member of the State board of tax commissioners by Governor Warren T. McCray to succeed Fred A. Sims, who resigned some time ago, is expected to assume his duties at once. Mr. Hough is an attorney. He was appointed for a four-year term.

Since Mr. Sims' resignation there has been a vacancy on the board. For the last two weeks the board has been associated primarily with the membership of only two, John Brown, Republican, and Philip Zoercher, Democrat.

Mr. Hough, according to Governor McCray, was not a candidate for the appointment.

'SKY ADS' NEW MEDIUM IN USE BY LOCAL FIRM

Miniature Balloons Carry Message of Furniture Company 125 Miles.

NEW HAVEN, Ind., April 22.—H. L. Lomont, who lives with his family in the suburbs of this village, recently had an object lesson presented to him in a manner by which he became thoroughly convinced that it pays to advertise, providing the method is far-reaching as the case which so forcibly presented itself to him.

Mr. Lomont relates his experience in a most lucid way, as follows: "Wednesday evening, April 13, my wife, while looking toward the sky, observed what appeared to be a large balloon, or a number of small ones, moving in a northerly direction, but slowly approaching the earth. She called my attention to the object and we watched together until it alighted about 500 feet north of our house. The balloons were released, the furniture firm said, to celebrate the opening of the baseball season at Indianapolis, April 13, when the Indians crossed bats with the Columbus Senators."

It appeared that there had been a gathering of bees at the time of their release, as two of them had been captured, because of having risen to an extreme height. On closer examination, I discovered the balloons bore the name of The World's Fair Furniture Company and I decided at once that an advertisement which could sail in the air for a distance of 125 miles was a far-reaching advertising.

"I then wrote to the Indianapolis firm to ask when they had released the balloons, so that I might know how much time had elapsed since release and the time the balloons came to earth near my home. The reply received declared that the little balloons had been released in the afternoon of the day of the opening and had traveled the distance of 125 miles in about two hours.

MUST FEED BEES NOW, SAYS YOST

Hunger Brings High Death Rate in Indiana.

In some parts of Indiana, particularly in the southern section, populous colonies of bees show a high death rate—as much as 50 per cent loss through starvation in one or two localities, according to C. O. Yost, apiculture inspector for the State department of agriculture. Mr. Yost has issued bulletins to several thousand beekeepers of the State warning them of the critical period at hand in bee culture and pointing out that where young bees are present in considerable number there is danger of serious loss if bees are not properly fed.

"Beekeepers are confronted with a somewhat unusual condition this season, due to the late, warm, fall, mild, open winter and early, pleasant spring. As a result brood rearing started quite early

and has steadily increased and as the colonies grow to strength many are filled to near the swarming point.

"These large colonies are made up of vigorous young bees whose purpose, at this time of the year, is to promote brood rearing and to increase the nest population, a thing they will do if they have plenty of stores and sufficient room. The chief danger confronting bees right now is starvation. Many reports show a 50 per cent loss through actual starvation already.

"Careful beekeepers who desire a max-


imum crop of honey will feed all colonies the first crop of stores until they have from ten to twenty pounds of honey laid up from the spring flow. Many beekeepers prefer a syrup made of white sugar and water, half and half (do not boil). Place the sugar and water in some convenient vessel and stir well, allowing to settle a few minutes and then stir again. Repeat this operation till the bees are satisfied.

"Bear in mind that a colony passing the winter, consuming fifteen to twenty-five pounds of stores, and then dying out, through partial or total starvation in the spring, will be 50 to 75 per cent of the honey consumed, besides the loss of a crop they might have stored, had \$1 more, or perhaps 50 cents, been spent in the purchase of sugar with which to push them at full speed through April and May to the clover flow."

"Mr. Yost calls attention that all plant life is further advanced this season than normal. Annuals, cover and other plants, just now, indicate a very thrifty season for the beekeeper who maintains proper colony strength and management," he says.
