

WALSH FIRM STAND FOR WAR VETERANS

Denounces Methods of Government in Care of ex-Servicemen.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Patriotism and confidence in the Government of the United States will be sacrificed unless this Nation gives immediate justice to its war veterans, Senator David I. Walsh, Democrat, of Massachusetts, declared in the Senate today.

Utterly denouncing the methods which the Government has adopted for the care of ex-servicemen, Senator Walsh declared that he had made a personal investigation of conditions at the Federal hospital at Washington, D. C., and that "invalided service men have been and are today housed in so-called hospitals under conditions that a self-respecting community would not tolerate its paupers to live in."

"The Government is caring better for immigrants who come to these shores than for its ex-servicemen," Senator Walsh stated.

Senator Walsh not only asked a Senate investigation of the hospitalization facilities, but urged that the Government commander seashore and summer hotels for use as hospitals until new hospitals can be constructed.

"Not only is hospitalization inadequate and deplorable," Senator Walsh said, "but men are being treated unjustly in matters of compensation, insurance and national education."

The Bureau of War Risk Insurance, the Federal Board for Vocational Education and the Public Health Service have "failed miserably in co-ordinating the needs and character of their operations," Senator Walsh charged.

CHI GIRL SHOT BY GIRL FRIEND

Assailant Turns Weapon on Self and Both May Die.

CHICAGO, April 27.—Jeanette Hoy, daughter of a well-known contractor, today fired two bullets into the body of Catherine Davis and then turned the gun on herself.

The tragedy was the result of a quarrel between the girls, who had been close friends for seven years.

Physicians said both were near death. The shooting took place on an elevated platform at Madison and Wabash, in the city of Chicago.

Police said Miss Davis received a bullet in the chest, and Miss Hoy a bullet in the arm.

Miss Davis, a bookkeeper, had just left a train on her way to work.

Miss Hoy, hiding behind a post, pulled a revolver from her handbag and fired. The bullets entered Miss Davis' side.

The girl with the pistol held the crowd at bay and rushed down the stairs to the street.

In the street, the girl who had been shot three times in her own body.

Police said Miss Davis received a letter from Miss Hoy recently enclosing a bullet.

Collins Fails to Appear at Howe Rally

Mayor Jewett and Band Entertain—Professor Gets in Word.

Judge James A. Collins of Criminal Court was scheduled to speak in the interests of Mr. Thomas C. Howe, former president of Butler College and New-England University, at a meeting at 1202 Nordyke avenue last night.

Judge Collins did not appear. The chairman of the meeting said he did not know where Judge Collins was and was taking an active part in a band having a couple of pieces and Mayor Charles W. Jewett, Professor Howe and Fred Hartman, brother of J. Herbert Hartman, candidate for the Republican nomination for city judge, spoke.

Mayor Jewett continued to spread the Howe campaign propaganda that Candidate Edward J. Robinson is running a "good fight," but at the same time told particular pains to show a few volumes of oratory in Mr. Robinson's direction. He rapped Samuel Lewis Shank in the same fashion he has followed since he got into the primary fight, told why he is out doing the administration and attempted to explain why he has been unable to get things done.

NOW WOULD RUN ON NO PROMISE PLATFORM.

"I think if I were to be a candidate for mayor, I would make no promises to do anything at all for any particular sections of the city, because I've found out that there are innumerable obstacles that get in the way once you start trying to do things."

The mayor said, summing up his plans of his failure to accomplish some things he had hoped to do.

"Ex-Mayor Caleb Denny asks why it is that I am taking an active part in Mr. Howe's behalf. This is the reason: Mr. Shank, Mr. Bookwalter, Mr. Denny, Mr. Robinson and all their supporters, who claim to be Republicans, have gone out and made open attacks upon the present Republican administration, and if this goes unanswered what are we going to say to the Democrats in the election?"

The mayor said that his administration has made an unusual record and "I don't propose to have anybody criticize it without my telling the people what the facts are."

He then turned the floor over to Mr. Howe's behalf. This is the reason: Mr. Shank, Mr. Bookwalter, Mr. Denny, Mr. Robinson and all their supporters, who claim to be Republicans, have gone out and made open attacks upon the present Republican administration, and if this goes unanswered what are we going to say to the Democrats in the election?"
