Gandil Starts Yelping Over Scandal Troubles

LOS ANGELES, April 23.—Vowing vengeance against Eddie Collins, Arnold (Chick) Gandil, former White Sox first sacker, was prepared to leave today for Chicago to face an indictment charging conspiracy to "throw" the 1919 world's series games against Cincinnati. Gandil claims Collins' ill feeling toward him is the cause of all his troubles. "I am willing to lay my case before any fan who saw the world's series games and have him say who tried the hardest in the series," Gandil said. Gandil was arrested late Tuesday night on a fugitive warrant and spent the night in jail. He was released on word from Chicago officials that he was to come East alone.

De Pauw vs. I. U.

GREENCASTLE, Ind., April 23.—De Pauw thinsy clads will board a Monon rattler for Bloomington Saturday morning intent on showing the Indiana University tracksters the knack of performing track events. This will be the first outdoor meet for the Tiger cinder artists, and the second for the State school athletes. The I. U. men were defeated by Earlham in their first outdoor meet of the season.
