Charles W. Smith Services
From Residence.

Funeral services for Charles W. Smith, 75, 119 East Pratt street, who died at his home shortly before 2 o'clock this morning, following an attack of pneumonia, will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, from his residence, with the Rev. Virgil Rorer, pastor of the Meridian Street M. E. church, officiating. Interment will be in Crown Hill cemetery.

Mr. Smith was one of Indianapolis' leading attorneys, and was a member of the firm of Smith, Remster, Hornbrook and Smith. During his practice in this city, he had been identified with many of the city's leading attorneys practicing in State and Federal courts.
