INDIANS CLING TO LEAD OVER THE WEEK-END

Down Brewers and Blues in Saturday and Sunday Battles—Caret Repeats.

K. C. S. AGAIN TODAY

Jack Hendricks' Indians held their hands up for the week end and once more gave the fans exactly what they wanted—two victories. After downing the Milwaukee Brewers in the series win-up Saturday, 10 to 5, the Hesitating Hoosiers trotted out on the field before a large Sunday crowd and turned the Stinging Blues back, 4 to 1. By virtue of the week end achievements the Indians are clinging to the pennant position in one of the hottest races in American Association history. Right on their heels are the two-time champions, the St. Paul Saints, who have been climbing the last ten days.

The Old Master, P. G. Carey, wheeled him up for the Blues to shoot at Sunday and he was careful to permit them to do most of their shooting when the bases were empty. As a result the veteran tacked up his tenth straight victory, making eleven victories out of twelve starts this season. Could any one ask for more?

Today it was to be the Blues again at Washington. In the Indians were expecting to see plenty of action. The K. C. boys are leading the league in hitting. But the Tribesmen are not letting that throw any fear into their camp and they are out to keep the victory ball shining. In the Sunday series the Indians out-hit the K. gang by two blows, their total being twelve against ten. The break came in the fifth inning when "Punch" Loomie smashed Ted Covington, who is in a slight batting slump, to get at Walter Roberg, who is just emerging from the throes of the flu. As a result Walter slammed one for two bases, scoring two men and making the total base total for the Indians six. The Blues added another marker. The Indians got their lone tally in the sixth, two doubles proving the run.

Caret and Hendline will represent the Indians in a four game series to be played at Louisville June 13 for the benefit of Mrs. Louise Knapp, widow of the late Empire State League pitcher. The clubs will form a team to meet the Colonels that day. The all-star game was selected by Louisville sport writers.

Caret is establishing a remarkable pitching record this season and his work is keeping the Indians out in front. P. G. touched rarer than a white rabbit but on those occasions he tightens and keeps danger away.

Manager Knabe of the Blues howled so much about P. G.'s pitching form Sunday that he forgot to mention a Blue runner on first base. Result: P. G. slipped the ball over to Covington and caught said Blue runner napping.

P. G. got himself two hits, one a double. Walter Roberg got two hits. He appeared to be out of the Blue runner while Ted Covington seems to be falling into one.

The lower end of the batting order was busy with the bat. Schreiber, Sicking, Hendline and Carey each delivered twice with safeties.

Outfielder Eddie Zwilling, former Indian, was not overlooked. Owner Smith of the Indians presented the popular Eddie with a handshake of roses at a mark of the "Dutch Windmill" fine work when a member of the Indianapolis team.

The Hoosiers added two double plays to their record.

Pitcher Johnny Ensmann probably will be traded to an International League team for a twister. Ensmann's home is in the East and he desires to play in that territory. Manager Hendricks is willing that a deal be made if a good pitcher can be obtained in the trade. The deal is up to Ensmann himself to negotiate.

Pitcher Pat Ragan, former National League star, who is a free agent, wants to try a "come-back" with the Indians. He may get the chance if he can convince Manager Hendricks that he can still pitch. Jack is not keen for any more experiments. He wants sure-fire talent.

P. G. Carey went up to Lafayette today to scout the Indiana-Purdue college game.

Sharp fielding by Schreiber brought about the game-ending out. Sunday Hank chased back into left field, grabbed Roberg's "Texas Leaguer" and buried the ball to Sicking in time to catch the Blue sliding into second base.

JACK'S RECORD SHOWS HIM AS QUICKWORKER

Corbett Says There Is No Denying Fact That Dempsey Deserves Title.

IN FINE TRIM ALREADY

Former World's Heavyweight Champion.

NEW YORK, June 6.—Jack Dempsey has proven himself a consistent knockout artist in his comparatively short career. He has a total of forty-five knockouts in sixty-eight fights and in this department of statistics he has proved himself superior to Georges Carpentier as a quick finisher. The Frenchman is credited with thirty-four knockouts out of a total of eighty-five battles accounted for by the records from 1907 up to date, a few of these being scored against heavyweights.

Of his fights since he invaded the heavyweight division Carpentier's victories over Wells, Beckett and Gansett are practically all that can be pointed to, yet in these bouts he proved himself a man who is capable of flooring men much bigger than himself and since he has never fought a man who could exceed him in this view, it is ridiculous to say just how good he is. That he is a great fighter by his weight and inches Dempsey's victories, four or five stand out far above the others. His victory over Fulton was the best of his career. Dempsey hurled at him man did the work. One was a left hander to the liver and the finishing blow a terrific right hook to the jaw. Either of these punches might have finished Fulton, but they were delivered in rapid succession. Fulton at that time was a very dangerous man. He has always been a terrific left hand puncher. But he was no match for Dempsey.

The Willard fight Dempsey was concentrated and better, in all probability, than he ever will be again. He was still in his prime and has confidence today that he didn't know when he faced Willard—the confidence that comes with the years.

Today he is in fine condition. His physical form has completely swept away the fear of his friends and after the Brennan fight that he had started to go back—(Copyright, 1921, by International News Service).
