MINTON, STATE COLLEGE STAR, TO JOIN TRIBE

Heavy-Hitting Indiana University Catcher to Show Prowess Here This Week.

BLUES OBTAIN LUTZKE

Roscoe Minton, star catcher of the Indiana University nine, will join the Indians the latter part of this week, it was announced at Washington Park today. Minton is hailed as one of the most promising catchers in Western collegiate circles and he will be given a thorough tryout by the Indianapolis club. The Crimson receiver is said to be a hitter also, and of course that means that he will stand a splendid chance of making good.

Manager Hendricks has had friends watching the work of the I. U. catcher for some time, and he is convinced that the big athlete will make a strong bid for a berth. Umpire Harry Gelles, who has been in charge of the Indiana State college games this spring, says Minton is all that his friends claim for him when it comes to catching and hitting the ball. George Gelles, of Minton, Indiana, and First baseman Schauab of Wabash College were the best performers of the State college ranks this season. Schauab is not giving much credit to his services, though, for he is a player, however, for he has one more year in college. Minton finishes his college career this week, playing his last game at Bloomington against Purdue today.

With the coming of Minton the Indians will have three catchers and the trio probably will be carried through the season with Butch Barnes as the utility man.

Another set of news dropped out of Washington Park today when it was made known that Rube Lutzke, utility player who quit the team when the Indians were in Milwaukee, has been called by the Bloomington Hatters. Captain of the K. C. outfit said he believed he had room for another infielder and he took Lutzke by the waves route.

CHANGES FOR OLYMPIC CARD

Tug-of-War and Other Minor Events Eliminated by Committee.

LUTZKE, June 7.—Four entrants and four starters will be the limit allowed any nation in future Olympic games. This and other radical alterations in the program of the games will be made at Paris and succeeding Olympic games were announced here following a long session of the Olympic Committee.

Two new weight classes were made in the program for future Olympic meets. The tug-of-war, the 3,000-meter walk and throwing the fifty-six-pound weight were dropped. The committee also decided to drop the 100-meter high jump, the 100-meter back stroke and the 200-meter breast stroke races for women.
