## FIGHT FOR BAIL MONEY LOOMS

Stevens' Return May Bring

Effort to Regain Forfeited

\$5,000 Cash Bond.

With the return of Edward Stevens from Carrollton, Ill., to this city where he is wanted in the Marion County Criminal Court on charges of burglary and armed robbery and was released on \$5,000 cash bond, the State is faced with the problem of what to do with the \$5,000 cash bond which was declared forfeited by Judge James A. Collins of the Criminal Court when Stevens failed to appear for trial some months ago.

Prosecutor William P. Evans has filed suit in the Circuit Court asking that the \$5,000 be distributed to the various school funds of the county and State. Since Stevens has been serving his sentence, the public money he has received indicates that there will be a legal fight to prevent the State from obtaining a \$5,000 cash bond which was declared forfeited by Judge James A. Collins of the Criminal Court when Stevens failed to appear for trial some months ago.
