

CHINESE KILL SCORES, TROOPS RUIN PROPERTY

Soldiers in Wuchang Loot
American School—Burn
Hundreds of Homes.

QUIT WHEN PAID OFF

HANKOW, China, June 10.—Mutinous troops in Wuchang, capital of the province of Hupoh, were under arrest today after they had destroyed much property, looted American property and killed scores of persons.

The soldiers were quieted when 1,800 men were given their back pay. First killing a number of their officers, the mutineers spread throughout the city, congregating in great numbers at the government bank. Loose cash in the institution was seized. The men then turned to the mint. The director in charge was seized and subjected to torture. He denied admission to the big vaults. Meanwhile several thousand men scattered throughout the city, throwing flaming brands among flimsily constructed dwellings. Hundreds of homes were destroyed.

Residents were thrown into a panic. Fire fighting apparatus was in default and for a time it was feared more than half the city would be destroyed. The American Trinity School was visited by one mutinous band, which ransacked the buildings, carrying away everything of any value.

The soldiers finally were quieted when promises were circulated that their back pay would be made up. Fifty of the mutineers were arrested when it was found they were carrying bars of gold and silver from the mint. They were taken to Ichang and held under arrest in barracks there, pending sentence.

The men were said to have been angered primarily by the government's new plan of disbanding surplus troops.

\$500,000 ALLOWED FOR EXPENSES

Court Fixes Sum for Use of
Dodge's Widow.

DETROIT, Mich., June 10.—Mrs. Anna Thompson Dodge, widow of Horace E. Dodge, the automobile manufacturer, asked for and was allowed \$500,000 for one year's living expenses in Probate Court. The award was made by Judge Edgar O. Dineen as the result of a petition filed by Mrs. Dodge.

The petition declared that Mr. Dodge in the seven years preceding his death had spent more than \$1,000,000 annually for the living costs of the family. There are two children, Delphine Dodge Cromwell and Horace E. Dodge Jr. Mrs. Dodge told the court that she needed \$40,000 a month for her own support and to help support the son and daughter. Judge Dineen allowed an even \$500,000 for the year beginning Tuesday.

Mr. Dodge died on Dec. 10 at his winter home in Florida. His brother, who was associated with him in the Dodge Bros. Company, had died about a year earlier, and Horace E. Dodge at the time of his demise was the sole head of the industry.

Twenty years ago the Dodge brothers were journeymen machinists in Michigan. In 1901 they started their own place in Detroit, employing only eleven men and using machinery taking in payment of a debt. Then they began to specialize, Horace becoming the technical expert on gas engines and John becoming the business executive.

When Henry Ford organized his company in 1902 he took the Dodge brothers in with him for a combined interest of \$10,000, the stock to be paid for by their manufacture of 600 chassis. In 1916 they won the action against Mr. Ford to restrain him from what they considered misuse of the company's profits.

A few years ago retiring from the Ford company, the Dodge brothers started the manufacture of their own car, which from the first proved a success. The greater part of their fortune was amassed in this venture.

CABINET PLANS END TO DISCORD

Harding Hears Accusation
Against Sims.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Elimination of factional strife and insubordination in the United States Army and Navy was before President Harding and his Cabinet today.

Secretary Denby, it is understood, will confer with Harding to secure his support in any disciplinary action he may plan against Admiral Sims for the London speech in which that officer played Irish sympathizers in the United States as "zebras, or asses."

Secretary Weeks, was also expected to talk with the President on the Menoher-Mitchell row in the air service, and to ask the executive's support in stamping out friction and internal politics in the Army.

WOMEN REAPERS APLENTY. WICHITA, Kan., June 10.—Men watch out that the women don't show you up in the harvest fields this year. The local employment offices report that they have received numerous inquiries from women who wish harvest work. Most of the women prefer employment as cooks, although several have announced they have no objections to doing manual work, if desired.

It is virtually a certainty that the State of Kansas will have a surplus of harvest hands for the crop this year.

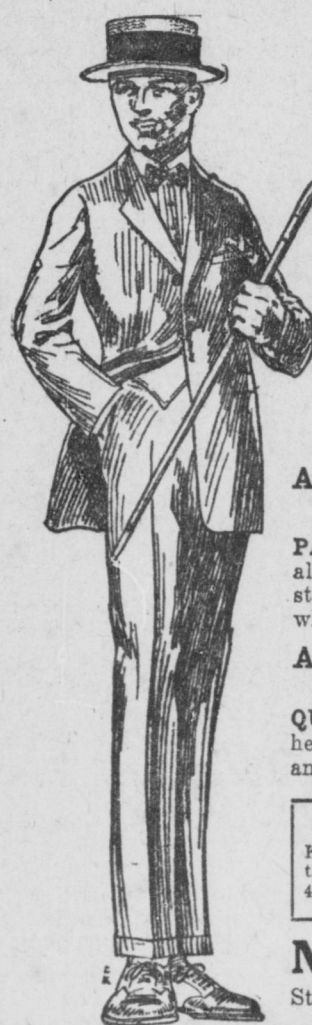
