

The Dempsey-Carpenter bout was far from a fluke. It was a record-breaker financially and in the greatest crowd ever witnessed in a boxing match. But better yet, it was successful as a contest, for Carpenter, the gamester, really went down to a glorious defeat, not having at his disposal his inferior right hand as an ally. That shows the kind of stuff he is made of.

A match between Dempsey and Willard would no doubt create a great deal of public interest and could get in shape for it. Ray Archer, Willard's business in thingsistic, who is now in New York, believes that big Jess can get into condition and predicts that if he is matched with Dempsey again he will not be caught unprepared.

There is little or no demand for another Dempsey-Brown fight. Brown does not expect to return with the champion who has beaten him out twice.

Carpenter, despite his defeat by Dempsey, is still great card. He would be a tremendous catch for the Frenchman who has arrived as a challenger to the heavyweight championship and whose string of twelve straight knockouts means something. French Accept Fall of Their Ring Idol in Graceful Style

Paris Fans Still Believe, However, That Georges Is Some Scraper.

PARKE, PARIS, July 4.—Despite Georges Carpenter's defeat by Jack Dempsey on Saturday the belief is current in Paris that Carpenter has not yet given up hope of becoming the heavyweight champion of the world. The press suggests that there are a number of light heavyweights in the United States whom Carpenter could beat and who would prove first class training preparatory to another bid for the world title.

The extreme interest in the fight has not yet died down.

Many pictures of the fight are eagerly awaited to obtain an exact description of the blows, particularly those dealing with the chin and to the heart.

Contradictory descriptions were received in France, some saying that an underweight boxer had been beaten by the Frenchman and others that a double foul had been committed.

Before Ertle's description of the bout was received, it was believed by all sportsmen that the fight was fair and square that Carpenter was beaten by superior strength and weight. Most of the French press, however, said the better man won. Carpenter's account, wherein he said he was completely beaten, after a long fight, was believed to be true.

Frenchmen, Carpenter said, have been satisfied.

It is a good fight," he said to the press.

He is awaiting the return of his manager.

"I shall consult him and cheer him up for the future bouts," said Mme. Carpenter.
