With a face looking as if it had been run over by a steam-roller, Carl Brock, 800 North Sherman drive, 210 Wyoming, appeared in city court today. The astonishing face caused Henry Abrams, judge pro tem, to order an investigation.

Motor-policeman Harris said he arrested Brock at Vermont and Muskingum streets last night on the charge of drunkenness and declared the prisoner was "full of good whiskey." The policeman said he was not beaten or bruised at the time of his arrest, but that it must have happened after he was locked in the cell room. Information obtained from a negro prisoner, brought the statement that he had been awakened during the night by a fight. 

GRAB FOUR ON DOPE CHARGES

Police Break Up University Park Narcotic Gang.

Four men are under arrest today on charges of violating the Harrison narcotics, and the arrests, the police believe, breaks up a gang of alleged "dope-handlers" who have defied the Federal officers in Indianapolis for a number of weeks. The headquarters of the gang was in the Harrison area, and it was there they disposed of their drugs.

It was there that the gang was arrested, and he was taken into custody two days ago. Last night Guy Broughton and E. C. Legan, Federal narcotics agents, arrested three of the alleged dope handlers in University Park. The men, all held on charges of violating the Harrison narcotics, gave their names as John N. Nelson, 201 East 11th street; Edward Greshenow, 25, 510 North Alabama street, and Edward Tierney, 25, "city." Each was held under a \$5,000 bond and the cases were continued in court today until Aug. 4.

EACH FOUND WITH DRUGS.

When arrested each was found to be in the possession of certain quantities of drugs, needless for use of "dope fiends" and other equipment used by "dope" users, according to Federal officers.

The method used by the alleged dope-handlers in obtaining their supply of drugs was unusual and difficult to stop.

These men according to the officers who made the arrests, were in the custom of going to the offices of physicians and then to take prescription blanks while the doctor was not in his office. Obtaining the physician's Government registration number, they were then enabled to put that number on the prescription blank and the doctor's name forged. The blank, who would note the signature and registration number, and would fill the prescription.

UNIVERSITY PARK HEADQUARTERS.

The "dope" dispensers, who the Federal agents say are also dope users, should then go to University Park which they say was the headquarters for the gang and meet their customers.
