

**CARRIERS VIE
FOR PATRONAGE
TO STATE FAIR**

Reduce Rates and Prepare
to Handle Large
Crowds.

That the steam and interurban roads of Indiana are getting back to "normalcy," and that the passenger agents have revived their pre-war energy is made evident in the sharp rivalry that is developing for passengers to the Indiana State Fair next week. For the first time in about six years both the railroads and trolley lines have made concessions in passenger rates to the fair, and while the reduction on the railroads is only 10 cents—a one-half fare for the round trip—the steam line passenger agents have their scouts at work in interurban territory, while the trolley passenger men are hustling to hold not only their usual fair patronage but to grab all from the steam roads that can.

The Monon and Lake Erie & Western passenger agents are advertising over steam roads, since their lines pass the gates of the State fairgrounds. Both of these roads will operate special trains during fair week.

The fair management is expecting many thousand visitors to come to the exposition in their automobiles and arrangements have been made for them by expanding motor car facilities on the grounds. The drivers have been classified, rated and listed. Roads from the south and east gates to parking-fields have been gravelled and rolled. About fifty acres of parking space on the west and east side of the ground, as well as north of the race track, will be open to motorists and about 20,000 cars a day can be provided for.

Several carloads of ground tankards have been spread along the lawns and tracks, some new footpaths of cinders have been made, and with the large permanent buildings now available the fair will be in position to provide for visitors whether the weather be fair or foul.

**CLEAN-UP SQUAD
MAKES RECORD**

Takes Six Days to End Case
Pending for Two
Years.

Adjustment of a claim for compensation in six days that had been pending for more than two years, is the enviable record made by the clean-up squad of the United States veterans' bureau in the case of Henry B. Kline, 112 Garfield avenue, who during the world war was a soldier in Company C, 22d Engineers.

Kline was discharged from service July 11, 1919, and shortly after that applied for compensation for disability incurred during the war. The case dragged along in the courts and had not been settled anywhere with it. Aug. 29, he called at the offices of the clean-up squad in the Meridian Life Building and his case was taken up immediately. Aug. 29, he received a letter from the bureau at Washington stating that he had been granted compensation of \$800 a month and would receive a check covering back payments from November, 1919.

**GROCERS AWAITS
DEMAND BEFORE
WRAPPING GOODS**

Hesitate in Anticipating the
Needs of Modern House-
wife.

Great piles of sacked beans, sugar, flour and other staple commodities, weighed out, ready for instant delivery to the trade, are not now found on the shelves of Indianapolis groceries. Inspectors of the city weights and measures department report that either Inspector Edward McGuffin or his chief, Inspector Edward McGuire, are giving this as the reason why the number of articles are weighed by them during their routine inspections of scales and packages in food handling establishments during the month of August was only 1,752 as compared with 4,774 in July.

Mr. McGuire said he believes the grocers for several months have been buying in smaller quantities and, therefore, they do not have the surplus stocks to put into ready packages in advance of calls from customers.

The inspectors will complete the annual inspection of every business house using weights and measures of any kind in the city by about Oct. 10, Mr. McGuire said. Purchase of an automobile for the department this year has helped speed up the work.

Chicago generally have made broader use of the department this year than heretofore, said the chief inspector. Many persons starting in business now call the department and ask that an inspector be sent to inspect their scales and measures before they are used. Instead of waiting until an inspector comes around on his regular call, frequently the inspectors find that scales are adjusted so as to make mistakes in favor of the customer, so that many merchants feel they are protecting themselves by having the city inspection as early and often as possible.

Manufacturers have started using the department recently. One firm had a controversy with a St. Louis metal jobber over the weight of two car loads of spelter. The local company claimed the two cars weighed 211 pounds short, representing a difference of \$100 in price. The weights and measures department was called to test the contents of the cars and found the local firm to be correct. This decision was accepted by the St. Louis people and the Indianapolis concern was given the requested discount.
