

INDUSTRIES IN OHIO DO BETTER

Youngstown District Leads in Increasing Steel Output.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 14.—Industrial assumptions in the northeast quarter of Ohio are mostly in the basic industries. Following the spurt in the Youngstown district iron and steel manufacture, reports are coming in from the smaller cities of quickening production. Additional mills are operating near Canton, and a few plants there report their operations to be 100 per cent.

The Stark Division of the United Alloy Steel Company, Canton, is running twenty-one out of twenty-eight mills; the United Furnace division is nearly normal and the United Alloy plant is between 40 and 50 per cent capacity. Canton Sheet Steel Company has enough orders to operate for several weeks at the present accelerated scale of seven mills out of thirteen. Superior Sheet Steel Company, Canton, will soon enter its eighth week at 100 per cent. The Louisville Sheet Steel Company, Louisville, Ohio, announces a material increase in orders and has increased its operations from 40 to 60 per cent for the coming week.

That Bessemer has the call over open-hearth steel at the present time in the steel trade is the assertion of a prominent manufacturer. This is because of the low cost of manufacture. The Bessemer plant of the American Steel and Wire Company in Cleveland has been running several weeks and the Carnegie Steel Company's Bessemer plant at New Castle, Pa., will operate next week, following the blowing in of two blast furnaces of the same company at New Castle this week.—Copyright, 1921, by Public Ledger Company.
