DISARMAMENT WOULD LOP OFF GREAT OUTLAY

Half a Billion Dollars Yearly Could Be Saved, Claim.

WAR HEAVIEST DRAIN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 23.—Half a billion dollars yearly can be saved to the United States almost immediately if the disarmament conference to open in Washington Nov. 11 approves the plan for substantial reduction of armaments.
