Business of I. W. W. Moves Without Presence of Bill

John Grady, Present Chief, Says Haywood Is Not Missed by Organization.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—William M. (Big Bill) Haywood may remain in Russia as far as the I. W. W. in this country is concerned, it was learned at International headquarters here today.

The I. W. W. is trying to forget that

John Grady, a 33-year-old ex-switchman and ex-adjutant of the Pacific Northwest, was holding down Haywood's job as big chief of the Industrial Workers of the World and he says as far as he knows nobody in the organization misses the former leader.

"Haywood—oh, yes, you mean Bill Haywood," said Grady in his West Madison office. "No, we haven't heard from him since he turned his \$15,000 bond for his release at trial."

"Well, pay the \$15,000. The bondsmen shouldn't lose. We're not doing it for Haywood, however. It's a matter of principle."

Asked if the I. W. W. was functioning without the picturesquely presence of Haywood, the dark, phlegmatic Grady smiled and glanced at him.

Girls were clattering away at typewriters. Men were over reports, large signs were being ground into literature depicting the "impending judicial murder of Sacco and Vanzetti by the State of Massachusetts," urging the release of Debs; spouting at the "soft" strike settlement made by the railroad brotherhood chiefs; boasting capitalists and proclaiming solidarity of the proletarians of every country and abolition of the Industrial Workers of the World.

"The I. W. W. doesn't need individual leadership," remarked Grady. "It favors mass leadership. As many members as possible should require administrative skill."

Functioning without Haywood? Why, according to Grady, the I. W. W. is just as well organized as it ever was.

In America industry is not ever bad before; its hour has almost struck."

The "wage slaves" the biggest

membership, and, by said, the membership is growing rapidly. There are 1,250,000 membership cards out, but not too many more than half that number. Grady is now organizing the "four basic industries."

He will leave for St. Louis tonight.

FOCH PREPARES TO QUIT SCENES OF CONVENTION

Leaves Kansas City Tonight for St. Louis on Trip East.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 2.—Marshal Foch, although showing a trace of fatigue from the strenuous program of yesterday, was astir early today.

The Marshal and other distinguished guests at the American Legion convention, prepared to bid the city good-by, for they will leave tonight.

Doors to the convention opened the final session and with the election of officers this morning and the final reports of committees the only business, the convention was expected to adjourn before noon.

Marshal Foch, long before many in the city were out, went to Rockhurst College for a 7:30 o'clock mass and memorial service for his son who was killed in the war.

At 9 o'clock at the college the degree of LL. D. was conferred upon him. At 11 o'clock this morning Marshal Foch and other distinguished guests made a tour of the boulevards of the city in motor cars.

This was for the benefit of the small school children who were unable because of yesterday's crowds to view the marshals in the motorcade.

At 1 o'clock Marshal Foch and General Pershing were to make a visit to the Legion meet and later a trip to historic Ft. Leavenworth will be taken by the Marshal and he will inspect the military reservation.

He will leave for St. Louis tonight.

DEVELOPMENTS ANTICIPATED IN ARBUCKLE CASE

District Attorney's Assistant on Way East on Eve of Trial.

Promises to Verify Charges of Hanging Soldiers Without Trial.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2.—Important developments were today reported in the Arbutke case, which is scheduled to go on trial next Monday for manslaughter as a result of the death of Virginia Rappé.

Leaving ostensibly on personal business Iandore Golden, assistant of District Attorney Mathew Brady, is speeding eastward, his exact destination unknown. His departure came after telegraphic advice from Chicago and New York and indicated that Charles Brennan of the defense were gathering evidence in the form of depositions which seriously attacked the State's case.

Affidavits taken in Chicago by Brennan had named the past life of the dead girl. Previously the defense had announced the character of Miss Rappé would not be disclosed.

District Attorney Brady challenged the truth of the Chicago statements and declared that if character was to be made an issue, he was prepared to picture the film comedian as a highly undesirable figure.

On the eve of this same word that Lowell Sherman, an actor, had made affidavit in New York that Arbutke was never alone with Miss Rappé at the gay hotel party following which she died. When Sherman went East Brady declared means would be found to force his return here, hinting at indictment which would be the only means on which he could be tried.

It also was recalled that Golden at one time threatened a nation wide scandal probe in connection with the Arbutke case. The district attorney's office would not discuss his mission East other than to say, "It is personal."

PORTSMOUTH, Ohio, Nov. 2—Hope of solving the mysterious double murder of Louise Doyle, 19, and J. W. Newman, 26, today rested with the county grand jury, summoned to make a probe tomorrow.

Authorities tracing leads, since the bodies of the two church workers were discovered in an abandoned cottage last Saturday, failed to make an arrest.

Officials have been unable to agree on a motive.

Sheriff E. E. Rickey was reported working on a new lead but he refused to make any comment.

JUDGE SUSPENDS 'MOTHER'S CASE

Warns of Imprisonment for Further Neglect.

Judgment was suspended by Judge Frank Lehr of the juvenile court today in the case of Roland and Ethel Kemp, 1523 Gilmer street, charged with child neglect in the deaths of two children from diphtheria. It was charged that the children had received no medical attention.

It was charged that a daughter, Buelah, 8, died Oct. 7, and that previously another daughter, Juanita, 6, had died of the same disease. Investigation revealed that another child, Isabelle, 1, was suffering with the same disease and she was given an anti-toxin treatment over the protest of the parents, who stated their religion forbade the administering of medicine.

During the hearing of the case, the court told the defendants that regardless of their religion the law required that they give medical attention to their children. The parents were put on probation for two years and warned that another complaint would mean imprisonment for both.
