Five Men Awarded Passes to
Various State Institu-
tions.

ONE WORKED BOX GAME

Fred McKinney and Frank Nelson,
charged with assisting three prisoners of
the Marion County Jail in an unsuccess-
ful attempt to escape from jail, today
were each fined \$50 and costs and sen-
tenced to one year on the Indiana State
farm by Judge James A. Collins of the
Criminal Court.

Judge Collins said this is the maximum
penalty provided by law for such of-
fenses. It was charged in an indictment
that McKinney and Nelson gave aid to
Clint Sizemore, St. John, and George W.
Miller in an unsuccessful attempt to es-
cape from jail some weeks ago. The trio
were held following the hold-up and rob-
bery of the Beech Grove State bank.

George Buda, 32, pleaded guilty to
a charge of the robbery of \$2,300 from Ben
Rotter, 2121 North Talbot street, and was
fined \$1,000 and sentenced from one to
fourteen years at the Indiana State
prison.

It is alleged that Buda worked the
"box game," when he was held in the
jail.
