

IN THE REALM WHERE WOMAN REIGNS

Daughter of D. W. Voorhees Seeks Office

Descendant of Famous Hoosier Will Run for Legislature.

Although the women of Illinois had the privilege of the ballot long before the women of Indiana had any form of suffrage, the State may have for the first time in its history a woman to sit in its Legislature after the new assembly is elected this fall.

It is expected one of the most strenuous and stirring campaigns of recent years will be waged for Mrs. Julia Voorhees Johnson of Peoria, whose name has been placed in the political field by her friends.

Mrs. Johnson is a granddaughter of Daniel W. Voorhees, the tall scion of the Wabash. It is needless to say, she is seeking the nomination on the Democratic ticket. The support shown to Mrs. Johnson will not be confined to party lines, since women's clubs, which are said to be very strong in Peoria, will support her regardless of party, and many business men are rallying to her support.

Under the laws of Illinois, a nomination in the primary is an amount to an election in the legislative district.

The result will be watched with interest by politicians and by the women of the State, both of whom are much concerned as to woman's entrance into politics and who will measure her worth in the political field.

Indiana has had her woman representatives in legislative halls in the person of Mrs. Jalla D. Nelson of Muncie who was elected to serve in the Indiana General Assembly of 1921. Mrs. Nelson made good for her constituency, and while the initial step in this capacity was a success, it was not confined to herself and the women of her State.

Indiana's neighboring State of Ohio also is coming forward with a woman candidate for United States Senator, in the person of Mrs. Virginia Harrington Green, a member of the Cleveland Board of education, who recently announced her candidacy. She will run independently of her own campaign manager.

Within the last week from across the seas—from Stockholm, Sweden—comes the word that the speech from the throne, at the opening of the Riksdag, made reference to the fact women had participated for the first time in the parliamentary elections, the admission of women to government being the new plus to be presented at the parliamentary sessions.

Women are entering the political field with the thought of service uppermost in their minds and with an ambition to do their work well.
