

POLICE THINK NEGRO GUILTY OF ROBBERIES

Intruder, Caught by Hotel
Clerk and Porter, Be-
lieved Burglar.

GIRL IS ATTACKED

Police believe Herbert Harper, 19, negro, 1234 Martindale avenue, who was caught by Oliver Fuller, night clerk and Neal Haynes, negro, night porter, of the Spink-Arms Hotel in the hotel wash-room early today is a burglar who prowled about the hotel and the Blachere apartments, just south of the hotel, earlier in the night.

Criminal activities of the night included a hold-up of a Brightwood car conductor for the fourth time in the last three months and an attack on a 16-year-old girl by a prowler in the rear of her home.

Haynes, the Spink-Arms porter, saw the shadow of a man who was stealing along a hallway on the first floor. He notified Fuller, and together they rushed into the washroom and captured the negro, who was unarmed. He attempted to explain his presence by declaring he had been admitted through a rear door by the cook, but the clerk called the police.

WOMAN REPORTS THEFT OF BAG

Earlier in the evening the police received a call from the Spink-Arms when Miss Mary Russell reported some one had entered her room and her gold mesh bag, valued at \$25, was missing. The window of her room opens on the roof of the one-story annex between the hotel and the Blachere.

While investigating the capture of Harper, Sergeant Dunn's emergency squad was told by S. H. Carter, night clerk at the Blachere, that he had seen a man prowling about the second floor of the apartment house a few minutes before the negro was captured in the Spink-Arms.

The police found tracks leading from a window in the Blachere, second floor, across the annex roof to a hall window in the Spink-Arms. Harper's shoes fitted exactly into these tracks.

NEGRO IS TAKEN TO HEADQUARTERS.

Harper was taken to police headquarters for questioning. At first he said he lived at 327 Ellsworth street. Sam Johnson, whom the police found there, said he had rented Harper a room for one night.

Further questioning brought an admission from Harper, the police say, that he lived at 1634 Martindale avenue. This house was searched, but no stolen goods were found. Harper tried at first to simulate drunkenness, the police said.

While the investigation was in progress the Spink-Arms clerk telephoned the police he had discovered that the kitchen had been entered during the night, but could find nothing of value missing.

Several days ago lockers in the basement of the hotel were ransacked and articles of small value taken.

The police say Harper has the alias of Will Arthur.

Charles Biegers, 39, 2321 Greenbrier lane, motorman, was in the vestibule of the car while the hold-up was taking place. It was his second experience of the kind, his conductor, having been robbed in the same manner about three weeks ago at Brightwood avenue and Twenty-Eighth street. Haggerty is the fourth conductor to be victimized at or near the end of the Brightwood line in three months.

As Miss Theresa Cleghorn, 328 South Temple avenue, stepped out of the rear door of her home, a man struck her on the head with his fist. She fell dazed in the snow and was unable to rise for several minutes. The man ran. Her brother, Irving Cleghorn, said he thought the man was trying to steal his chickens.

BURGLAR USES KEY IN ENTERING HOUSE.

While the family was gone a burglar with a key opened the front door of the home of Mrs. Charles Halblud, 61 Elm street, and after ransacking the house, left with \$15.

Police are holding Earl Goldie, 21,

Goldie was sent to the city hospital Monday night when he told the police he shot himself while dreaming in bed at his home. City hospital physicians told the police the wound was much older than Goldie asserted. SUNKEN GARDEN MINIATURE FOR FLOWER SHOW

Elaborate Decorative Scheme
Planned for Florists'
Exposition.

A reproduction of the sunken garden of Garfield Park miniature, which will be prepared by the city park board, and an unusual exhibit of fancy gold fish provided by the State board of conservation, are two features of the national flower show which were announced yesterday at the third weekly meeting of the local executive committee for the fifth national flower show, which was held in the Chamber of Commerce building.

An elaborate decorative scheme beginning in the downtown district, leading by way of North Meridian street and Maple Road to the Manufacturers' building at the Indiana State fairground, was revealed by the committee on exterior decorations.

Announcement was made by A. F. J. Baur, secretary of the Carnation Society, that, in addition to the 10,000 rose plants which will be distributed on "Rose Day" at the exposition, an equal number of carnations will be given away on "Carnation Day." Ten thousand hardy shrubs will be distributed by the nurserymen. James H. Lowry, chairman of the nurserymen's committee, reported to the executive committee.

Clarence R. Greene, chairman of the special features committee, has arranged to have "Chicago Day" on Monday, March 27, when the largest delegation of Chicago florists that ever left that city for a national show is promised by the Chicago Florists' Club. There also will be "Cleveland Day," "Women's Club Day," "Indiana State Day," "Chamber of Commerce Day" and "Men's Club Day."

A national flower show committee gave a report regarding the general progress of the exposition, and John Young of New York City, secretary of the Society of American Florists, who is making his headquarters in the Chamber of Commerce building, told the members of the executive committee that he had never seen finer cooperation than was being shown in the preparation for the coming national show.
