Grocer Finds Prowlers Made
Raid on Cash Register—
Yeggmen Fooled.

NEGRO IS HELD UP

Two burglaries, an attempted safe-cracking and a hold-up, none of which resulted in considerable losses was reported to the police last night and early today.

James Selmer, 207 North Keystone avenue, left his grocery store at 6 o'clock and returned at 8 to find a burglar had tried a padlock off of the front door and robbed the cash register of \$33.38.

Thieves entered the home of Webb Arnold, 144 Hoyt avenue, while the family was away and stole a diamond ring and a flash light.

Amateur pogo broke glass in outside and inside doors at the plant of the Standard Dry Kiln Company, McCarty and Harding streets, and tried unsuccessfully to force the safe open. They broke the combination and the handle off the safe door. J. L. Beldon, 420 East St. Clair street, merchant-police man, discovered the attempt on his round shortly after 9 o'clock. Company officials were informed, but reported nothing of value missing.

Two men held up Rhoden Whitlaw, negro, 214 Indiana avenue, in an alley near St. Clair street and Indiana avenue and robbed him of \$14 and a watch.

GUARDS AGAINST BOOZE RAID TIPS

City Clerk and Police Only to
See Warrants.

Because of suspicion that liquor raids proposed by the police may have been "upped off" by outsiders who pled in his office City Clerk John W. Rhodes, here today announced he will use ex-

traordinary precautions to prevent search warrants from being seen by anyone but the police and himself.

The custom has been for the police, in filing search warrants, to lay them on Mr. Rhodes' desk. If he happens to be absent from the office, hereafter the police are to hand the papers personally to the clerk. Later a locked box with a slot in it may be installed to receive the warrants. The clerk would carry the key.
