

ANSWER FOUND TO ATLANTIC CABLE MUDDLE

Italy Plans Construction of
Line Through Mediter-
ranean.

OTHERS TO HELP PAY

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WASHINGTON, March 3.—A solution of the Atlantic cable question which for more than a year had perplexed the international conference dealing with the allocation of former German cables, has been found it was learned today.

This plan probably will be presented to the conference within the next two or three days. It contemplates the construction by Italy from Rome or Genoa through the Mediterranean and connecting with the trans-Atlantic lines at the Azores.

No provision is contained in the proposal for turning over to Italy, the Azores-New York cable now operated by France, the consensus of opinion being, under the present assignment of lines between the Azores and New York, there are ample facilities for all business.

A substantial part of the cost of the new Mediterranean cable would be paid for by the nations other than Italy which have an interest in the former cables. The remaining share of the cost would be borne by Italy, the amount being paid over a considerable period of time, as the cable earned profits from the traffic carried.

The scheme regarded as most feasible is that the funds for the initial installment to be paid to the company constructing the Mediterranean cable should be taken from the earnings of all the former German cables, which under the modus vivendi, agreed to by the powers more than a year ago are being operated for joint account.

While this plan has not yet been formally accepted by the powers, careful examination of the contention by all concerned, has convinced those most concerned with the problem, it meets all difficulties and it is believed the plan will be adopted.

Acceptance by Italy of this would remove her objection to the agreement arrived at during the arms conference as to the allocation of the German cables in the Pacific, the reservation she then registered being based on direct communication between Rome and New York.

WILL CONSTRUCT FEEDER LINES.
On completion of the cable, Italy expects to construct a system of feeder lines to various feeder lines in the Mediterranean. In view of the growth of commercial interests of the United States in the Near East, such communication is expected to prove of immense value to the United States.

Direct communication between New York and Germany for which Italy's Government had contended would be afforded by the two German cables now being contracted for by a private corporation.

The North Atlantic cable, from Pensance to Halifax, would continue to be operated by Great Britain for traffic from England to Vancouver and Australia. The operation of this cable has proved rather expensive, there having been several breaks which were difficult to the British to repair.

VOYAGE COST FIGURES SWING TO RIGHT SIDE

Shipping Board Report, However, Not to Show Clear Profit.

Philadelphia, March 3.—Preliminary figures for February indicate that the voyage expenses of Shipping Board vessels in the hands of managing operators show a slight balance on the right side of the ledger for the first time.

These figures also show that the managing operators took in approximately \$6,500,000 during February, and paid out about \$6,400,000. This does not mean that the ships were operated at a clear profit, since other charges, which are not chargeable to voyage operations. They do show, however, that instead of losing a million or more on voyage operations in February, a small balance was shown on the other side.

In July of last year the loss from voyage operations was \$1,800,000. In December it was \$1,245,000. In January the loss was cut to \$534,000, so that the favorable balance in February really represents a change for the better of more than \$1,000,000.

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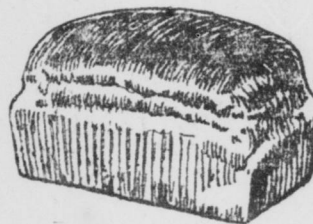

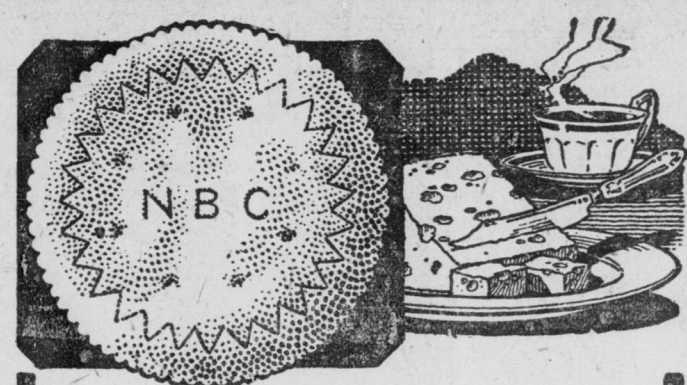
