Five From This City Get Advanced Degrees.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., March 9.—Among the ninety-six students of Indiana University who are in the field of science and literature and who will receive advanced degrees on completion of their studies in the graduate school of the State university are the following Indianapolis students: Ruth Wetter, A. M.; March Carter, Mills, economics and sociology, A. M.; Mary Margaret Dougherty, Spanish, A. M.; and Mrs. Anna Lillie Dickey, English, A. M.

A recently published list shows more than 1,700 such treatises and books have been written by graduate students and faculty members of Indiana University, since 1894.

DISAPPOINTMENT IN GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, March 9.—Keen disappointment was expressed in official circles today over the refusal of the United States to participate actively in the international economic conference at Genoa next month. The attitude of the United States was not completely unexpected, however. Premier Lloyd George has made it possible to approve some of the decisions of the conference.

Downing street officials expressed surprise over the reasons given by the American State Department for not participating in the conference, but the "moderate" conference had been called to adjust conditions of which the United States complained. It was denied there was any political significance to the meeting.

For the time being foreign affairs are overshadowing the political crisis in Downing street, but the Tory "idle hands" in the coalition party. The premier's health has improved and he is attending to his official duties.

"We are not surprised at the refusal of America to participate in the conference," said Mr. Arthur in the British foreign office. "The Genoa conference will be held according to plan and it is hoped America will send observers."

So serious has the Indian situation become that the Cabinet decided to take it up today instead of waiting until tomorrow. The political unrest in India is regarded as critical and the Premier is anxious to unite his colleagues upon a settlement policy at the earliest possible time.

While the Irish Free State act, officially establishing the new Irish state has passed the House of Commons upon third and final reading, it is understood the enemies in the House of Lords intend to put up a fight against it. This will be more for display than any other reason, as passage of commons makes the bill effective.

RUSSIANS BUILD UP GREAT HOPES

MOSCOW, March 9.—All classes in Russia, except the great mass of ignorant peasantry, look forward to the Genoa conference as the first step toward reunion with the outside world.

Merchants, college professors, army men, newspapermen—all see in the conference a definite release from the isolation which has been imposed upon the country since 1917.

To official Russia—the Kremlin and the Communist party about three hundred thousand strong—Genoa means achieve-

ment of a long cherished ambition, official recognition by the world at large. It means an opportunity to lay a real foundation of government. It is a mixed blessing, because it means abandonment, for the time being at least, of the great of world revolution and a return to the principle of nationalism.

The rest of Russia will benefit more than the politicians.

"It will at least give us some idea as to what to expect," a merchant said.

"Genoa will show us whether commerce with the rest of the world may be expected on a large scale immediately."
