

## BROWN RITES CONDUCTED AT NEW LONDON

Death Follows Acceptance of  
Friends' Church Pastorate  
at Richmond.

Funeral services for Albert J. Brown, 56, 333 North Irvington avenue, minister and business man, who died at the Methodist Hospital following an operation Saturday, were held at New London, today.

Mr. Brown recently had accepted the pastorate of the Friends Church at Richmond and was making plans to move there next week with his family. He also was president of the Indiana division of the American Heating and Ventilating Company.

He was born at College Corner, Union County, Indiana, and received his early education in the public schools of New London. After finishing high school, he taught for several years and then entered Indiana University. At the end of his junior year he went to Leland Stanford, where he was graduated from that institution in 1902. A year later he received the M. A. degree.

During the summer of 1902 he was sent to Alaska by the Government to make an ethnological survey of the Indians for the World's Fair at Chicago the following year. After his return from Alaska, he became pastor of the Friends Church at Westfield, Indiana. In 1904 he married one of the Irvington High School and also was pastor of the First Friends Church in Indianapolis for five years. He was president of Wilmington College, Wilmington, Ohio, from 1903 to 1912, when he became connected with the Fairman Heating and Ventilating Company.

In the winters of 1919 and 1920 he did child labor work in Saxony, Germany, for the American Friends' service committee, under direction of Herbert Hoover.

He is survived by his widow, two daughters, Miss Helen and Althea Brown, and two sons, Sidney S. and Robert Brown, all of Indianapolis.

## MAN IS FOUND DEAD FROM GAS; INQUIRY BEGUN

Death Believed Accidental—  
Two Attempted Suicides  
Are Reported.

With gas heater turned on but not lit, Michael Dwyer, 66, was found dead in his room in a rooming house at 2728 East Washington street early this morning.

Dr. George Christian, deputy coroner, started an investigation to determine if death was accidental or if Dwyer committed suicide. It is believed by persons at the rooming house death was due to accident.

Mrs. Christian Kissel is the owner of the house. Dwyer as a rule gets up at 4 a.m. to go to work, but on this night he had stayed in bed. Mrs. Kissel found him on the door. Receiving no answer and detecting the odor of gas, she called other roomers. Bradley Taylor and Leo Roberts forced the door and found Dwyer lifeless on the floor. The body was taken to the J. J. Blackwell Undertaking Parlor.

Mrs. Kissel said she was sure Dwyer's death was due to an accident. She said he had lived in Indianapolis many years, and had roomed at her home five years. Dwyer is survived by three daughters and a son all living in Indianapolis. He was employed by the Capitol Lumber Company.

## SIGNS INDICATE 'NORMALCY' SOON WILL BE HERE

Employment and Home Building  
Reports Forecast  
Better Days Near.

WASHINGTON, March 20.—Two of the fundamental economic indicators—employment and home building—show today an economic signal is approaching more rapidly than month.

The Department of Labor and the Department of Commerce reported an increase in employment and home building plans of great magnitude. More than one million homes will be built this year, the Commerce Department estimated from reports from all parts of the country.

Figures from twenty-seven northeastern States, housing more than two-thirds of the population, show remarkable increases in home building. In February, normally three of the lowest building months in the year, the increase was about 10 per cent.

The report states: "Builders and contractors are preparing for their biggest year since the war. Tens of thousands of idle construction workers are being absorbed in this new work and by summer there may be a shortage of skilled labor."

Of forty basic industries canvassed by the Department of Labor nine showed increased numbers of employees for February this year over the same month last year and five showed decreases. The most important increases were in the automobile and hardware industries. The increase in automobile plants was 58.4 per cent and hardware and underwear 56.4 per cent.

The iron and steel industry registered a decrease of 13.6 per cent and paper-making 11.4 per cent.

ROCHESTER, Mich., March 20.—Two of the accident in which Assistant General Superintendent Edward H. Ives, of the Detroit United Railways, his wife and two children and a girl ward were killed was ordered here today.

Trotski said he thought Russia would succeed in convincing the powers that understandings with Russia are possible only through acceptance of the soviet's views.
