

## 118 PATIENTS RECEIVE CARE OF SUNNYSIDE

Month's Report Shows Service and Activities of Sanatorium.

According to the monthly report of Dr. H. S. Hatch, superintendent of Sunnyside Sanatorium, there were a total of 118 patients, of which fifty-six were men, thirty-five women and twenty-seven children on March 20.

The Marion County commissioners today received a copy of the report showing that a total of forty-four patients were hospitalized during the month ending March 20. A total of eight patients were admitted last month.

### REPORT OF PATIENT DEPARTMENT FILED.

The report of the activities of the outpatient department for last month is as follows:

Visits made to homes of patients, 80; visits made in behalf of patients (sanatorium), 52; total of patients under supervision of supervisor of Indiana clinics, 10; number of clinics conducted by nurses and fresh-air school nurses, 208; number of visits made during the month by same, 242; total number of visits made in the Sunnyside patient home, 10; number of telephone messages for or about patients, 59; number of letters written for or about patients, 12; number of patients taken to and from the hospital in nurse's car, 1; days spent at Sunnyside Sanatorium, 9; number of clinics held exclusively for sanatorium cases 8; number of patients admitted to these clinics, 12; total number of visits from old patients, 52; total number of visits of patients to Sunnyside clinics, 44; number of applicants for admission to Sunnyside during the month, 27; number of applicants rejected, 8; number of applicants on hand, 44; estimated number of contacts in homes of patients visited during the month (children, 23 adults, 27), total, 52; number of cases referred to Flower Mission for hospital care, 4; cases referred to the same, 3; number of cases referred to Charity Organization Society, 2; number of cases referred to Public Health Nursing Association, 2; number of cases referred to Fresh Air School, 1.

### PER CAPITA COST FOR TWELVE MONTHS \$2,239.

The total pay roll for the month amounted to \$2,113.42, the report shows. The per capita cost for twelve months ending Feb. 20, 1922, was \$2,239 and the per capita cost to Marion County for the same period was \$2,235. The total per capita cost for a twelve-month period ending March 20 was \$2,235 and the per capita cost for the same period of Marion County was \$2,03.

The report shows that the total cost of food served from Feb. 20 to March 20, inclusive, was \$2,194.50. The total number of trays served was 2,267 and the total number of patient days amounted to 3,196.

CHICAGO, March 31—Modern civilization needs a new Bible edited along "newspaper lines," Dr. J. M. Vance of Wooster College, Wooster, Ohio, declared before the national convention of the Religious Education Association here.

The new book, according to Dr. Vance, should carry headlines, subheads, editorial and news bulletins. It should contain the same old and new testaments, he said, but should be "put up in a style to meet the needs of the twentieth century."

"Biblical literature should be stressed. Young America is totally ignorant of the Good Book as it is now written. Something should be done to acquaint them with its great truths."

## SAYS TREATY MAKING GRAVE SENATE DUTY

Beveridge Refers to Weighty Problems of Solons in Terre Haute Speech.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., March 31—Framers of the Constitution of the United States would stand aghast if they could hear some of the bizarre notions now advanced regarding the part played by the Senate in the making of treaties, Albert J. Beveridge, candidate for the Republican nomination of United States Senator, said at a meeting held under the

auspices of the League of Women Voters here last night.

Mr. Beveridge said the duty and responsibility of the Senate, when passing upon a treaty, is far greater and greater than the duty and responsibility of the President, for the President or the Secretary of State, acting as his agent, can merely negotiate a treaty, while the power and responsibility of making effective and putting it into force falls upon the Senate alone.

### TREATIES CANNOT BE REPEALED.

Few persons realize the fact that a treaty once ratified cannot be repealed as simply as is the case with a law. It cannot be changed without the consent of both parties to the treaty, the speaker said.

"If today public sentiment favors the enactment of a certain law," Mr. Beveridge said, "and Congress accordingly passes that law, and tomorrow public sentiment changes, Congress can repeal or amend that law, as the people then desire. But, if today public sentiment

favours the ratification of a treaty, and the Senate accordingly ratifies that treaty, and tomorrow public sentiment changes, the Senate cannot repeal or amend that treaty as the people then desire."

"The President can do nothing except to negotiate a treaty—he has no power whatever beyond that. The Secretary of State is nothing but the President's agent. A treaty, when negotiated, is merely a proposal, exactly like an unsigned contract.

### RATIFICATION LIKE SEALING MORTGAGE.

"A treaty does not become binding—indeed, it does not become a treaty at all—until the Senate ratifies the treaty. Ratification of a treaty by the Senate is

exactly like the signing and sealing of a mortgage by the owner of property when mortgaging that property.

The Senate, in other words, partakes

of the same rights and duties as the

President, for or against a treaty is

fatal to the Republic, betrays his oath of

office, and violates the Constitution.

No words of condemnation exist strong

enough to brand properly such a public

servant. Party politics stop at the sea-

shore. Woe to America when this golden

rule of patriotism is abandoned by Ameri-

can Senators."
