

## CHRISTIANS TO RENEW EFFORT TO HELP WORLD

Convention to Be Held in  
1924, Following Joint  
Conference.

LONDON, March 31.—Another international conference to diagnose the ills of the world and search for a remedy is in the making.

A conference of all the Christians of the world to put the weight of Christianity into a movement to cure the social, political and economic ills of mankind is being proposed by the leaders of England who have already taken steps to secure support for the movement from the leading churchmen of America.

The Right Rev. William Temple, Bishop of Manchester, is one of the leaders in the movement for a conference to be held in 1924, with a preliminary conference in 1922 in Great Britain and the United States.

"The conference springs from two convictions," Bishop Temple declared, in explaining the movement. "The first is that civilization is really in need to discover its own fundamental moral principles. To a great extent the methods that have brought us so far seem unable to carry us any further or to maintain the progress that has been won by them."

"For example, to some extent at least, individualism in the past depended on the stimulus of fear. The worker has protected himself against this fear in a very large measure. Therefore, that stimulus is now inoperative. Either we must find another or discover some method of reviving the old one. But when we come to that choice the other conviction comes into play—namely, that fundamental Christian beliefs, quite apart from any of the questions on which the Christian bodies are divided, can supply a clue to the solution of all the problems of politics, economics and citizenship."

"There is no intention to form a specific Christian political party. Nothing could be farther from the minds of those inaugurating the conference."

"We are looking for the will of God. We believe that if people of varied experience and common faith will come together, not to convince each other, but chiefly to learn from each other, and with the desire and expectation that God will guide their thoughts, we shall at the end genuinely know a great deal more of His will, which is another way of saying the truth about the world, than is known to any group or individual."

"We do not expect to be guided to the formation of an ideal state. We do hope and expect to receive guidance which will direct the next steps that have to be taken."


The road will cut straight through a portion of the famous Indiana sand dunes and is expected to cost more than a million dollars.

## ADE GIVES \$500 OF STATE QUOTA TO WELLS FUND

### Series of Card Parties at Governor's Mansion Follows.

The Indianapolis Wells College Club is making plans for obtaining money for the college endowment fund. The first series of card parties, to be given this Thursday and Friday after Easter, at the mansion of Governor McCray on Fall Creek boulevard. The plans of the parties are in charge of Mrs. Scott Legg, president of the club, assisted by the rest of the members, Miss Katherine Ritchie, Miss Lucille McCray, Miss Mabel Wheeler, Mrs. W. H. Diddell, Mrs. R. W. Skinner, Mrs. W. H. Hurl and Miss Anna Kothan. Indianapolis was one of the first four cities having a Wells Club to reach its full quota of \$2,997. Miss Lucille McCray, State chairman for the campaign, announced at the

first report meeting a gift of \$500 from George Ade.

Mrs. Frances Cleveland Preston, national chairman of the Wells College endowment campaign, gives her view of a Wells College girl, and asks that more girls of this sort be written about.

"At least," said Mrs. Preston, "I know her, never seems to be mentioned by Mr. and Mrs. Grandin, who are disseminating the modern generation in newspapers and magazines, and at every kind of public and private gathering."

This type is the vigorous, independent, physically healthy young girl, who thinks for herself and has a wonderfully good time out of life, but whose ideals and conduct are just as high as those of any previous generation. If not higher. This kind of modern girl is to be met in every community, and she is

one of the finest assets of the community. She is a good neighbor, kind and takes an active interest in public questions of all kinds. She plays her full part in athletics and social life, but she also takes the keenest interest in social and political questions; and, as she grows older, becomes active in every form of beneficial community effort—in philanthropic, educational and political movements for the betterment of the people. This type of girl is especially common in our American colleges."

Of the 1,823 living alumnae of Wells College today, 328 have entered the teaching profession, including twenty-one college executives and forty-three college professors, and only in this country in foreign lands as well—Japan, Persia, Turkey, Africa, Hawaii, Porto Rico and Palestine; eighty-four Wells alumnae

are in business and "holding down" such posts as founder and manager of a furniture firm; landscape architect; manager of a company manufacturing bread machinery; interior decorator with a leading New York firm; manager of a dairy farm and assistant bank cashier.

A former student is the wife of the present Secretary of State, Charles E.

Hughes. Other alumnae have helped mold careers of a former Justice of the Supreme Court, a former Ambassador to France, a United States Senator and a former Minister to Spain. Still another

is leading the life of a busy doctor, and at least fourteen hold executive positions in leading hospitals and dispensaries. A graduate of the Wells Music Department is an instructor in Damrosch's Art Institute in New York; another is a leading poet and co-founder of "Poet Lore," and another was one of the pioneers in newspaper work for women. By far the greatest number of Wells graduates have chosen to marry and carry the ideals of their college into new homes.


