

## Highways and By-Ways of Lil' Ol' New York

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NEW YORK, April 28.—Westchester County is shivering with alarm—alarm over the possibility of being the next county to be gulped down by the metropolitan set. In the opinion of Westchesterians, all that New York has to offer is larger taxes and misgovernment, the misgovernment, they say, of that gigantic set, the Tammany Tiger. Their fear has crystallized into talk of turning themselves—four small cities, eighteen towns and more than twenty villages spread out over 450 square miles—into the new city of Westchester, and thus make a united front against the encroachments of the octopus of American cities.

Geographically, the people of Westchester County are in for it, for they are domiciled in the direct path of upward expression of the "six millions." The boundary of the State of New Jersey lies New York City on the west, and the Atlantic Ocean is the southern boundary. The metropolis can grow territorially in but two directions, eastward on Long Island and northward into Westchester County, its sweeping front lawn.

The assessed valuation of property in Westchester County is about \$700,000,000, and its population something a little under 500,000. A nice, toothsome morsel or the hungry metropolis cat, is it any wonder that the integral parts of Westchester County are moving closer together, like the cows in the field when dark clouds in the sky signal the approach of a thunderstorm? There is a greater strength for resistance in a bundle of fagots than in the same number of fagots offered singly for breakage.

Holding the units of Westchester County together is a slender cord—the board of supervisors of forty-seven members who meet weekly in a \$750,000 county courthouse at the most central of the units, which is the small city of

White Plains. Supporting that cord in another binder, namely, the Westchester County Chamber of Commerce, which has asked Governor Miller to appear before it on May 18, and outline a solution of the problem, for Westchesterians generally agree that their board of supervisors is an unwieldy body, more of a public forum than anything else, and what is needed is some sort of a small central governing body with a responsible executive in charge.

The fate of Brooklyn, Staten Island and a large portion of Queens County is ever the appellation of Westchester County; the canaries that went down the red gullet of the metropolis cat in 1898, called the Greater New York consolidation. If the absorption of Westchester County is attempted, undoubtedly the chief witnesses for Westchester called to the bar of the Legislature would be people in Staten Island who pay city taxes, and still receive their mail by R. F. D., and travelers in Brooklyn, who bitterly resent the subordination of the autonomy of the "City of Churches" into Brooklyn's present hated nickname of "New York's bedroom."

The four small cities in Westchester County are Yonkers, with more than 100,000 population; Mt. Vernon and New Rochelle, each with 30,000; and White Plains, with 25,000 inhabitants. The township of Greenburgh, one of the eighteen, is said to be the wealthiest in America, with oodles of millionaires, grading down from John D. Rockefeller Sr. and his brother, William. In the proximity of Irvington alone, the domain of a score of "eight figure" men, reckoning their material side and, what is more to the mustard, they are seriously active in local government affairs.

Almost the entire county is residential, villages that have grown until they touch. There is some foreign population in Yonkers, Mount Vernon, Peekskill, Ossining and North Tarrytown, but the

overwhelming bulk of the residents is about as American as that term can apply. Obviously Westchester County is dead against being passed into the bopper of a metropolis that glories in its foreign votes. True, about one-fifth of the dwellers of Westchester County are commuters who gain their bread in the great city below, but as rapidly as possible they conserve their wealth and retire to the fastness of their sylvan retreat, only visiting New York to shop and take in the theaters. 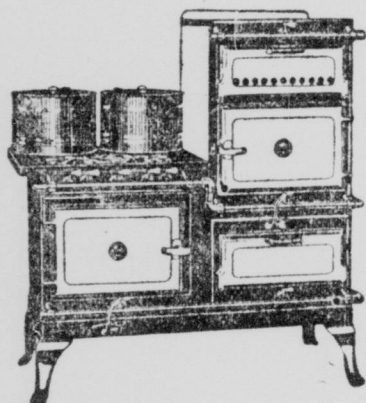

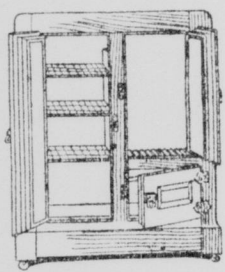
