# INDIANS CLOSE WITH MILLERS IN FRAY TODAY

Tribes Does Well in Big Series—12,000 Fans See Sunday Game.

## SCHREIBER HITS HOMER

MINNEAPOLIS, May 1.—With the series standing two to one in favor of the Indians, the wind-up game today attracted more than the usual amount of interest. Thirty thousand fans witnessed the first three games of the Indians' first home series, and it had weather did not interfere this afternoon, a couple of more thousand were expected to be added to the total.

Robt. Schreiber was slated to "go" for the Cardinals today and Cavet was thought to be in line to fling 'em for the Indians.

More than 12,000 fans were in the park Sunday when the Indians nosed out an easy victory. It was a big struggle, and even Owner Smith of the Hoosiers got excited. The Indians had the edge 5 to 3, when the ninth inning opened and the great crowd of fans was decidedly happy. Then it happened. Purcell batted for Hill after one out and sent a Texas Leaguer to left. Selb ran for him. Baird was careful and stepped on base on balls. Hank Schreiber stepped up to the plate and gave the home fans heart failure by socking the ball for a home run. That made the score 5 to 6 in favor of the Indians. In the Miller's half of the ninth inning, batting for Russell in the ninth, Mt. a home run, which raised the Miller's total to seven, where it stayed.

The Miller's got fourteen hits to eleven for the Indians. Five home runs were made, three by the Hoosiers. Corning, Selb and Schreiber got circuit clouts for the Tribe. Krueger got three safeties for the visitors.

Petty, Bartlett, Hill and Cavet did the pitching for the Hendricksens and Shaw and Williams for the Miller's.

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# Ivey Big Star for Earlham, Capturing Four Track Events

Quakers Down Western State Normal in Close Meet—Score, 69 to 61.

RICHMOND, Ind., May 1.—Coach Ray Mow's evenly balanced Earlham College track team defeated the Western State Normal of Kalamazoo, Mich., on field held Saturday by the score of 69 to 61. The Quakers won first in nine events, and tied for first in another event, out of the fourteen track and field contests.

Charles Ivey of Earlham scored twenty points for the Quakers, winning first in both hurdle races, the running high jump and the running broad jump. His best performance was in the 120-yard high hurdle, in which event he crossed the barriers in the fast time of 14.4 seconds. He stepped the 230-yard high hurdle in 26.5 seconds, jumped 21 feet 3 1/2 inches in the broad jump and won the high jump at 5 feet 6, not trying at a higher mark.

Smith of Earlham won the 100-yard dash in the low time of 11 seconds. Dalton, the tall Quaker distance man, won the mile in four minutes 42.5 seconds, and stepped away from the track in the two-mile, running it in 10 minutes 34.4 seconds. Kalamazoo was second in both runs, 409-yard dash, the shot put and discus.

Smith of Western State Normal finished first in the 220 and 440. His team was fast in both events. Hulseher won the shot and discus for the visitors. He put the 16-pound shot, 41 feet, 10 1/2 inches, and hurled the discus, 116 feet, 7 inches. Coach of the Quakers was second in both weight events.

The feature race was the half-mile run. The meet at that time was close. Six men were well bunched at the end of the first quarter with Walker of Kalamazoo leading. He strided and opened up a space of ten yards, but with 220 yards to go Robinson of Earlham passed the leader and raced across the line five yards in the lead. Jones of Earlham was third, and the javelin throw, hurled it 146 feet 1/2 in.
