

## BYRNES CALLS ATTENTION TO HUGE DEFICIT

Says Federal Shortage Will Total Nearer Billion Than Estimated.

## DUNBAR QUOTES FIGURES

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Representative Byrnes of Tennessee, ranking Democratic member of the House committee on veterans, at the opening of the House a number of large expenditures, authorized and prospective, which he said were not included in the December budget, estimates and which he predicted would increase the Federal deficit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923, to a figure approaching a billion dollars.

Mr. Byrnes made the assertion that new taxes would have to be levied to meet the deficit he computed, bringing quick return from the Republican side that his figures were not complete and were misleading.

Recalling Secretary Mellon's recent estimate of a \$500,000,000 deficit, Mr. Byrnes said the secretary had the same figure made out for him, \$15,000,000 for rivers and harbors, \$17,000,000 for hospitalization, \$5,000,000 for the Liberian loan, \$6,000,000 for roads, \$50,000,000 for a ship subsidy. He added that several members regarded as a questionable estimate of \$75,000,000 for the soldiers' bonus by Jan. 1, making the statement that, while the amount was not included in the deficit of \$75,000,000 was in sight and probably would be increased. He called it "an astounding record for the second year of a Republican administration in the face of its promises that taxes would be reduced."

Two Democratic members, Representatives McSwain of South Carolina and DeWitt of Wisconsin, added that Byrnes' recent Department of Justice estimates placed the amount of claims against the Government in the neighborhood of a billion and a half dollars.

Representative Dunbar, Republican of Indiana, answered that receipts totaled \$60,000,000 over disbursements, so far this year and at the end of the year probably would total \$50,000,000. He said the secretary of the treasury's figures failed to mention nearly \$400,000 to be used in cancelling outstanding Government obligations.

Mr. Dunbar suggested that the treasury deficit computations might have been somewhat overestimated for the purpose of impressing upon Congress the necessity for answering economy.

## SCHOEN FIELD IS DEDICATED

Impressive Ceremonies at Ft. Harrison Sunday.

Schoen aviation field, Ft. Benjamin Harrison, named in honor of Lieut. Kurt Schoen, Indianapolis aviator, killed overseas, was dedicated with impressive ceremonies Sunday. Addresses were made by Maj. Gen. George W. Read of the 5th Army corps area and Judge Arthur R. Robinson of Indianapolis from a platform erected over a giant Martin bombing plane in the field of honor.

An all-day invitation to all air officers in the corps area was sent out. Officers flew from McCook field, Wilbur Wright field at Dayton, Ohio, and from Camp Knox, Ky. Nearly every member of the Indianapolis Aero Club attended.

Judge Robinson, who knew Lieutenant Schoen when they were in the first officers' training camp together, eulogized the dead aviator.

## English Ranks First With Denver Parents

DENVER, May 8.—The study of English takes first rank with students and parents of Denver's high schools, according to announcement here by Superintendent of Schools J. H. Newton.

Superintendent Newton sent out questionnaires to each school's parents to determine how entering high school and to parents of both, with the result that an overwhelming majority returned answers indicating English as the most important study. Mathematics ranked second in choice, while history and civics were given respectively the third and fourth place. Public speaking was awarded little consideration by the pupils and parents.

The questionnaires also indicated that study at school was favored over study in the home.

Upon inquiring upon the returns on the "subject of most value," Superintendent Newton declared that it was cause for serious thought that history and civics were assigned a low place by both students and parents. "The study of the history of the United States and its government are of supreme importance in preparing boys and girls for citizenship," he said.

## Disabled Vets Choose City as Headquarters

Indianapolis has been chosen as the location for the permanent headquarters of the Indiana department of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War. Offices will be moved here soon.

At the opening of the convention held here last week it was decided that the second annual convention in 1923 shall be held in Lafayette, Ind.

A. T. Allen of Evansville, was elected State commander. Other officers chosen were: State vice commander, J. C. Hansen; Indiana state adjutant, William H. Daniels; Indianapolis assistant state adjutant, J. C. Elstrop; Valparaiso; members of the state executive board, J. A. McKinney, Lafayette; King Bailey, Valparaiso; T. T. Minor, Angola and L. E. Meyers, Indianapolis. L. F. Mauldin of Lafayette, was elected state delegate to the national convention which will be held in San Francisco in June.
