

EMPLOYMENT REFLECTS AUTO INDUSTRY RISE

Thousands of Men Are Given Work in Month of April.

DETROIT, May 12.—Steady improvement in the automobile industry here is reflected in the employment situation, and Detroit once more is riding the crest of a wave of prosperity. Employment agencies for the first time in eighteen months report a slight surplus of jobs over the number of work applicants. Rooming houses, the Y. M. C. A. and hotels of the moderate rates all report keen demand for rooms from men returning to the city in search of employment.

The demand for automobiles is pre-eminently here, and Detroit factories decide. With the Ford Company taking the lead, all the automobile concerns are expanding daily. Thousands of men were given employment during the month of April, and unless the demand for cars takes a decided slump several thousand additional men, particularly those of the mechanical type, will be assimilated during May.

Edsel Ford, president of the Ford Motor Company, said the company increased its employee list by 9,000 during the month of April. The Packard Company announces it will take on 1,000 men during May to provide for increased production. One hundred men are being given employment every day at the Highland Park and River Rouge plants of the Ford. The new plant, which will be continued as long as there can be assimilated, Edsel Ford announced.

More than 4,500 additional employees will be put to work by the Fisher Body corporation on completion of its \$2,000,000 addition to the West End plant, officials announce. Building operations in the addition are nearly completed. The total enrollment in all plants after the new unit is in operation will be approximately 100,000. The addition itself is 1,000 feet in length and six stories high, with a floor space of 650,000 square feet.

ANNIVERSARY OF NURSE IS CELEBRATED

Florence Nightingale's 102d Birthday Observed by Hospitals.

The hospitals of Indianapolis and four thousand other hospitals throughout the United States and Canada held open house today and observed with special programs the one hundred and second anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, "Lady of the Lamp," whose work in alleviating suffering during the Crimean war and later in civic hospital administration in England, have given her the place of the foremost nurse of history.

In commemoration of Miss Nightingale's service to medical science in establishing nursing as a desirable and fitting profession for women, the homeopathic hospitals, now open their doors to the public and conducted visitors through all departments of their institutions, to show the facilities for training young women in this rapidly growing profession. Demonstrations also were given to the women visitors of the best methods of home nursing. General visiting hours were observed in most of the hospitals from 1 until 5 o'clock.

St. Vincent's Hospital held a reunion of nurses and internes. A radio program was given at the hospital during the afternoon and this evening the hospital will observe the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of its nurses' school. The program for the evening will include a playlet by the student nurses, several musical numbers and addresses by the Rev. Francis G. Gaskin, Dr. Frank Morrison, Dr. J. H. Oliver, Dr. O. C. Pfaff and Mrs. J. Herman, one of the first graduates of the nurses' school.


