

## CHILE-PERU DISPUTE MAY BE ADJUSTED

Washington Scene of  
Another Peace  
Meeting.

AN ANCIENT FEUD  
European Parallel in  
Alsace-Lorraine  
Question.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Another Washington conference for the preservation of peace is on today. It concerns the peace of South America, menaced intermittently for nearly forty years by the ancient feud among Chile, Peru and Bolivia over the west coast nitrate provinces of Tacna and Arica. By good omen, the conference, officially known as "The Chilean-Peruvian negotiations," will be held on the premises of the Pan-American Union, immortalized for all time as the scene of the successful Washington conference on naval armament and the Far East. Secretary Hughes will formally inaugurate proceedings with an address of welcome and then retire from them, for the United States is not officially a party to the dispute.

The conference was instigated by President Harding, in pursuance of his policy of eradicating causes of international strife by negotiation, rather than by war. For more than a generation Tacna and Arica, known as Peru's "lost provinces" since the war of the Pacific in 1879, have formed the "Alsace-Lorraine question" of the Americas. Periodically, as its European namesake did, the question threatened to embroil the two republics that fought in 1879—Chile against an alliance of Peru and Bolivia—in another and far bloodier conflict. Efforts to remove causes of strife proved futile. The treaty of Ancon, ratified in 1884 and signed in the market place, it would promote peace, remained a dead letter. Its provision for a plebiscite to decide the final ownership of Tacna and Arica has never been carried out. Matters continually drifted from bad to worse. Chile and Peru armed against each other from year to year just as Germany and France did, in preparation for a final reckoning on the field and sea of battle.

**CHILE PROPOSES TO OBSERVE TREATY.**  
In December 1921 Chile submitted to Peru a proposition for the carrying out of the plebiscite proposal of the treaty of Ancon. Peru did not reject the proposition outright, but suggested a general arbitration covering the whole question growing out of the "war of the Pacific." This was unacceptable to Chile on the alleged ground of the impossibility of revising a treaty which was in force and "fulfilled in all its provisions except the one now in question (plebiscite)."

It was at this point the Chilean-Peruvian direct negotiations broke down, amid an atmosphere of the greatest tension on both sides. President Harding's influence was thrown into the scales. By instructions of the President, Secretary Hughes on January 13, 1922, sent identical notes to Chile and Peru, inviting their governments to send plenipotentiaries to Washington for a conference with a view to securing a settlement of the unfulfilled clauses of the Treaty of Ancon. "The United States," the note was inspired "in the interest of American peace and concord" and emphasized our anxiety "to assist in a manner agreeable to both governments concerned in finding a way to end this longstanding controversy."

**BOTH GOVERNMENTS RESPOND FAVORABLY.**  
Both the Chilean and Peruvian governments responded favorably. They accepted President Harding's suggestion and named plenipotentiaries. Chile is represented at the negotiations by Senator Carlos Aldunate Solar, a lawyer, senator and counselor of state and Senator Luis Iquintero, Chilean minister to the Argentine. Peru's representatives are Senator Hernan Valarino, Peruvian minister to the Argentine and Senator Meliton Ferras, a former minister of foreign affairs.

Bolivia is not a direct participant in the negotiations. But it is vitally interested in their outcome as either of the conferences. The territory in dispute between Chile and Peru bars Bolivia from an outlet to the Pacific. She fervently hopes her "shuttered window" somehow may be opened by the time the Washington conference is ended. Shortly after President Harding proposed negotiations in Washington to Chile and Peru, Bolivia through her president, Senor Saavedra, made an impassioned telegraphic appeal

to Mr. Harding to be included in them. It was represented that in consequence of the war of the Pacific Bolivia's outlet to the sea had been lost, and President Saavedra beseeched President Harding to cooperate with him in securing a modification of the Chilean-Bolivia treaty of 1904, which transferred to Chile sovereignty over the whole Bolivian coast. President Harding informed Bolivia that he was not acting as an arbitrator in the Chilean-Peruvian dispute and that the inclusion of Bolivia in the discussion between these two countries was a matter for their exclusive consideration.

**PARAMOUNT INTEREST IN PROMOTION OF PEACE.**  
The paramount significance of the United States initiative in promoting the conference is a manifest interest to have a major part in settlement of questions affecting the peace of Latin America. President Harding's instigation of the Chilean-Peruvian negotiations was a benevolent exemplification of the "big stick" policy advocated by President Roosevelt. The Harding initiative moreover, has succeeded, where two attempts outside of the Western hemisphere—at the Paris peace conference in 1919 and before the League of Nations a year and a half later—both failed. At Paris General Montes, former president of Bolivia, unsuccessfully cooperated with President Wilson in an effort to bring the question before the nations then assembled. After the disintegration of the League of Nations, Bolivia submitted the controversy to the assembly at Geneva, but Chile maintained the league was without jurisdiction. There was reference to a committee of jurists, which sustained Chile's contention. Later Chile offered to deal directly with Bolivia, but that proposal, too, was futile.

Matters reached a climax last year when the President of Chile, Senor Alessandri, ostentatiously refused to participate in the centennial of Peru's independence. The relations between the two states became menacing in the extreme and but for President Harding's intervention might by now have eventuated in war.

All concerned are hopeful the Washington conference will bring about a long-sought settlement under mutually acceptable conditions. Chilean and Peruvian diplomats in Washington have been at loggerheads for months, buried the hatchet on the eve of negotiations. **"HIGH GRADERS" JOB MADE HARD**  
New Army Regulations Seeks to Stop Disposition of Stolen Gold.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Gold "high graders" who steal thousands of dollars annually from mine owners by holding out nuggets and high grade ore will face added difficulties in disposing of their loot.

P. E. Scooby, director of the mint, today issued an order to all United States assay offices requiring the filing of an affidavit setting forth the source of the gold brought in to be assayed. This action, he said, was taken in response to pleas of mine owners who are seeking means of curbing "high grading."

"High grading" has been carried on by crooked gold miners since the days of the California gold rush in 1849, Mr. Scooby said. The sale of this stolen gold has been virtually stopped in the West, where it always came under suspicion. Recently he said, shipments of "high grade" have begun to appear at the assay office in the East, particularly in Philadelphia and New York.

## NEW 9-STORY STRUCTURE TO BE BUILT NOW

William M. Fogarty and Ira M. Holmes Announced as Owners.

A nine-story building, to accommodate printing shops and small manufacturing plants, will be erected at 323 East Market street, it was announced today by William M. Fogarty, president of the Fidelity Trust Company, and Ira M. Holmes, attorney, owners of the enterprise. Mr. Holmes and Mr. Fogarty also have leased two lots on the southeast corner of Market and Alabama streets and will erect an office building thereon later.

The manufacturing building will cost approximately \$300,000, and construction is to be started at once. Ninety per cent of the space is contracted for, the owners said.

Construction will be of steel-reinforced concrete, with foundation and floor supports of such type as to permit installation of heavy machinery and use of high voltage electricity. Mr. Fogarty and Mr. Holmes hold a ninety-nine-year lease on the land, with a option to purchase for \$150,000 in the tenth year. Rental the first ten years will be \$7,500 and \$5,000 the second decade. Thereafter the rental will be based on appraisal every ten years. Buildings to be razed to make way for the new structure have stood for almost seventy years.

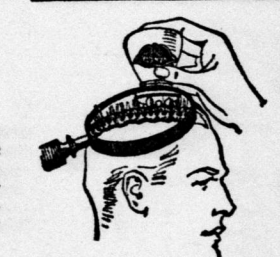
