

CHILE-PERU DISPUTE MAY BE ADJUSTED

Washington Scene of
Another Peace
Meeting.

AN ANCIENT FEUD
European Parallel in
Alsace-Lorraine
Question.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Another Washington conference for the preservation of peace is on today. It comes in the wake of South America, which entered intermittently for nearly forty years by the ancient feud among Chile, Peru and Bolivia over the west coast nitrate provinces of Tacna and Arica. By good omen the conference, officially known as "The Chilean-Peruvian negotiations," will be held on the premises of the Pan-American Union, immortalized for all time as the scene of the successful Washington conference which ended the war of the Far East. Secretary Hughes will formally inaugurate proceedings with an address of welcome and then retire from them, for the United States is not of officially a party to the negotiations.

The conference was instigated by Pres.

dent Harding, in pursuance of his policy of "eradicating causes of international strife," by negotiation rather than by war, by which a general peace in South America, known as Peru's "lost provinces" since the war of the Pacific" in 1879, have formed the "Alsace-Lorraine question" of South America. Periodically, as its European namesake did, the question threatened to embroil the three republics that fought the 1879-83 war against each other for another bad blood conflict. Efforts to remove causes of strife proved futile. The treaty of Ancon, ratified in 1884 and signed in the mutual belief that it would promote peace, remained a dead letter. Its provision for a plebiscite to decide the final ownership of Tacna and Arica had never been carried out. Minorities continually drifted from here to there. Chile and Peru armed against each other from year to year just as Germany and France did, in preparation for a final reckoning on the field and sea of battle.

CHILE PROPOSES
THE OBERHORN TREATY.

In October 1921 Chile submitted to Peru a proposition for the carrying out of the plebiscite proposal of the treaty of Ancon. Peru did not reject the proposition outright, but suggested a general arbitration covering the whole question growing out of the "war of the Pacific." This was unacceptable to Chile on the alleged ground of the impossibility of revising a treaty which was in force and "fulfilled in all its provisions except the one now in question (plebiscite)."

It was at this point the Chilean-Peruvian direct negotiations broke down amid an atmosphere of the greatest tension on both sides. President Harding's influence was thrown into the scales. By instructions of the President, Secretary Hughes on January 18, 1922, summoned the Chilean and Peruvian ministers to Washington and invited their governments to send their plenipotentiaries to Washington for a conference with a view to securing a settlement of the unfulfilled clauses of the Treaty of Ancon. The United States note was inspired in "the interest of Americans peace and concord" and emphasized our anxiety "to assist in a manner agreeable to both governments concerned in ending a war to end this longstanding controversy."

BOTH GOVERNMENTS
RESPOND FAVORABLY.

Both the Chilean and Peruvian governments responded favorably. They accepted President Harding's suggestion and named plenipotentiaries. Chile is represented at the negotiations by Senator Carlos Allende Solari, Minister of War, and counselor of state and Senator Luis Izquierdo, Chilean minister to the Argentine. Peru's representatives are Senator Hernan Velarde, Peruvian minister to the Argentine, and Senator Milton Pellas, former minister of foreign affairs.

Peru is not a direct participant in the negotiations, but is as vitally interested in their outcome as either of the conferees. The territory in dispute between Chile and Peru bars Bolivia from an outlet to the Pacific. She fervently hopes her "shuttered window" somehow may be opened by the time the Washington conference opens. It is the desire of President Harding to propose negotiations in Washington to Chile and Peru, Bolivia, through her president, Senor Saavedra, made an impastioned telegraphic appeal

NEW 9-STORY STRUCTURE TO BE BUILT NOW

William M. Fogarty and Ira M. Holmes Announced
as Owners.

A nine-story building, to accommodate printing shops and small manufacturing plants, will be erected at 223 East Market street. It will be leased to Mr. Fogarty, president of the Fidelity Trust Company, and Ira M. Holmes, attorney, owners of the enterprise. Mr. Fogarty and Mr. Holmes also have leased two lots on the southeast corner of Market and Alabama streets and will erect an office building thereon later.

The manufacturing building will cost approximately \$300,000, and construction is to be started at once. Ninety percent of the space is contracted for, the owners said.

Construction will be of steel reinforced concrete, with foundation and floor supports of such type as to permit installation of heavy machinery and use of high voltage electricity.

Mr. Fogarty, Mr. Holmes hold a ninety-nine-year lease on the land, with a option to purchase for \$150,000 in the tenth year. Rental the first ten years will be \$7,500 and \$8,000 the second decade. Thereafter the rental will be based on appraisal every ten years.

Buildings to be razed to make way for the new structure have stood for all most seventy years.


