

STEEL LABOR SUBJECT FOR DINNER TALKS

President's Session With Leaders Surrounded by Cloak of Mystery.

OFFICIALS ARE PUZZLED

WASHINGTON, May 18.—President Harding has invited the heads of the steel industry of the United States to dinner at the White House tonight and to a subsequent conference on conditions in the industry.

Although the exact trend of the discussion has not been disclosed, it is understood that the way and means for the abolition of the twelve-hour day in the industry will be discussed and proposals for a more general observance of the eight-hour day will be laid before the steel men. Details of the conference were refused at the White House and elaborate pains were taken to surround the meeting with an air of mystery. More than half of the fact that the steel men had been invited was obtained from reluctant White House officials only when meager information regarding the dinner leaked out.

SECRETY ABOUT SUBJECT MATTER.

The secrecy maintained regarding the affair tended generally to confirm the suggestion that the labor situation in the steel mills was the main reason for Mr. Harding's invitation to the steel leaders.

It was also felt that the situation was led immediately to the belief that the subjects to be discussed involved more than routine phases of the steel industry, such, for example, as its relationship to railroad rates. Nor was it clear that the President expected to discuss with the steel men the proposed merger of the six big independent steel companies which is expected to follow the recent combination of the Bethlehem Steel Company and the Louisiana Steel Company. The fact that invitations have been extended to Judge Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the board of the United States Steel Corporation, and James A. Farrell, president of that corporation, is regarded as excellent indication of the merger question. If it is discussed at all, will not constitute the main topic.

Since President Harding already has announced that he will dine a group of railroad executives Saturday night, often-

sibly to discuss freight rates, with the idea of inducing substantial reductions, there is little reason to believe the present secrecy tactics would be maintained regarding the steel dinner, if the discussion is to move along the lines announced for the White House railroad session.

NOT CONNECTED WITH COAL STRIKE.

It was said officially also that the conference was in no way connected with the coal situation, and the President and his advisers have been studying the steel industry, with the growing conviction that a certain amount of Government interest or suggestion regarding some of its methods would be amiss.

"The Administration, it is understood, now realizes the importance of bringing the changes working conditions in the steel industry and convinced that governmental suggestions will go a long way toward inducing the operators to make the changes voluntarily. No coercion on the part of the Government, is expected, but the steel men will be appealed to remove to the causes which unquestionably caused the steel strike of 1919."—Copy-right, 1922, by Public Ledger Company.


