SWEEP STATES**

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 22.—Three persons were reported killed and several were injured in tornadoes and cloudbursts that swept the southwest today night demoralizing communication in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

The storm toll:

- Lawton, Okla., two men reported killed in tornado; heavy property damage.
- Shawnee, Okla., property damage from cloudburst at Belle Plaine; damage from storms at Winfield and Wichita.
- Walnut Springs, Texas, tornado in Mesquite County; cloudbursts and floods in Somerville County.
