

## CONCLAVE OF REPUBLICANS TAME AFFAIR

Delegates Do Not Like  
Lack of Frills and  
Thrills.

NO BIG CONTESTS

Naming of Lynch Last  
Business Except  
Oratory.

When the Republican State convention closed, after a two-day session devoted principally to oratory and lacking any semblance of a contest, either in the adoption of a platform or the naming of candidates, the delegates themselves expressed disappointment that both the thrills and frills which they came to Indianapolis for had been lacking. The last of the delegates were departing for their homes today.

With the nomination of Patrick J. Lynch of Newcastle for renomination for clerk of the Supreme Court, business of the convention ended. Except for one and one-half hours, the entire convention was taken up with platform speeches, and the remainder was concerned with the reading of the platform and the nomination of candidates. When Rush County was called on in balloting for Lynch and Roberts, the latter, whose candidacy appeared more formidable than was anticipated, rose to the speakers' platform and after a brief speech asked that the nomination of Lynch be made unanimous. Mr. Roberts declared he believed many of the delegates casting their votes for his opponent believed that he (Lynch) was seeking a second term of two years like other State officers. Such, he said, was

not the case, declaring Lynch was a candidate for a third term. Roberts' motion to make Lynch's nomination unanimous received a quick second and was passed.

Lynch was called on for a speech and expressed appreciation for the nomination which he had received. He said the nomination of no one man was important, compared with the naming of ticket which would win in November. A threatened fight on the floor of the convention over the adoption of the public service commission plank and tax question failed to materialize. At the last minute after insistence upon the part of Governor McCray the plank which would take from the State tax board the right to approve or disapprove bond issues of cities, townships and counties was withdrawn and not read. Some of its supporters were expected to go on the floor of the convention, but not a single voice was raised when a motion

was made for the adoption of the platform as read. The result was an even break between the "home rulers" and the supporters of the State administration.

**Judge Says Color  
Will Play No Part**

"Race, creed or color will have no significance in this court during my term as city judge," was the rebuke handed the defense attorney in the case of Thomas Hanley, negro, 133 South Arlington avenue, being tried in city court on the charge of driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor and running a blind tiger.

The case was continued until May 27 because several of the State witnesses for some unknown reason were not in the courtroom when called to testify.

## OPPOSITION TO INDIANA BOARD

Opposition to the practices of the Indiana State board of registration for professional engineers and land surveyors in granting and refusing licenses was the general trend of extemporaneous speeches made at a luncheon yesterday given by the Indiana Chapter of the American Association of Engineers, in the Board of Trade building.

The suit brought by George H. Hereth, a member of the society, recently denied

a license, to compel the board to take action upon his application, was discussed at length.

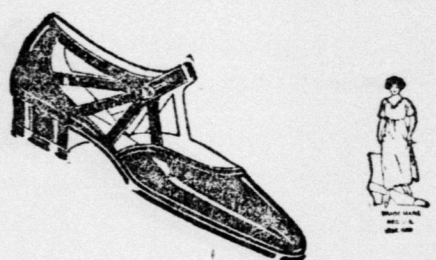

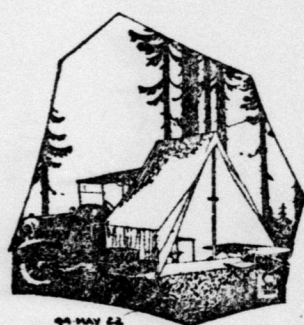
