

## MASS MEETING FOR MISSIONS

### Third Christian Church to Have Unique Event.

An event unique in the religious life of the church will take place tonight at the Third Christian Church, when a missionary mass meeting will be conducted as one of the features in connection with the commencement exercises of the College of Missions.

A banquet will be served in the church parlor at 6:30 o'clock, followed by the larger meeting in the auditorium at 8 o'clock. The Rev. T. W. Grafton is the pastor of Third Church.
