

ENEMIES SEE LLOYD GEORGE EMBARRASSED

English Government
Loses Committee
Issue.

TALK OF ELECTION
Parliament Adjourns
Awaiting Policy
of Ministry.

LONDON, June 22.—The Lloyd George government was defeated in the grand committee of the House of Commons today. The committee adopted an amendment to the National Health Insurance bill which the government had opposed.

The house adjourned immediately following announcement of this defeat, to permit the government to consider its position.

Immediately the lobby of Parliament seethed with talk of a general election. Defeat of the government in the House of Lords yesterday, when the Palestine mandate policy was rejected 60 to 20, despite the Earl of Balfour's maiden speech, followed so closely by today's defeat, gave opponents of the government something definite upon which to base their demands for resignation.

The government recently was defeated in the house on a minor question relating to teachers' salaries, but the ministry ignored the matter because whips had not been put on, and only a small house was present.

NIGHT AFFAIR

HAGUE PARLEY.

Lloyd George's political enemies, embittered by successes scored by the premier in typical Lloyd George fashion since his return from Genoa, feel that now is the time they can most embarrass him by forcing the issue. With British delegates at The Hague carrying on the premier's Genoa policy, resignation of the ministry probably would mean collapse of the entire project of reconciliation with Russia. Lloyd George's one big international project would be swept away.

The "die hards" who hate the premier because of his stand on Ireland, and the Labor leaders of Parliament who are bitter because 800,000 workers in engineering trades were forced to capitulate and accept employers' terms following a lock out, will be united against Lloyd George when the present issue upon which the government is defeated in committee, comes before the House.

TWO COURSES OPEN

TO GOVERNMENT.

The government has two courses open. To pocket the issue, introduce the bill providing for national health insurance with the amendment forced upon it and say nothing, or rewrap the whole measure, submit it to the House of Commons and demand a vote of confidence on the issue.

The latter course is fraught with considerable danger, although a combination of the conservative majority of "dead" voters in the House and Lloyd George's persuasive eloquence would undoubtedly guarantee him a small majority.

Political observers say that unless Lloyd George himself is ready to resign and continue in office until after The Hague conference.

A general election is due in the fall anyway, and it is merely a question now of what Lloyd George considers the best time to hold one.

THREAT OF TAR AND FEATHERS FOR PROHIBITION HEAD

Letter Signed by Ku-Klux
Klan Ignored by Recipient
John T. Davis.

HARRISBURG, Pa., June 22.—A letter to John T. Davis, State prohibition director, which stated that unless he resigns within the next ten days he will be "tarred and feathered," and signed by Ku-Klux Klan, caused no little commotion in the office of the director. Mr. Davis, however, remained unperturbed.

The letter was received by the director from the Central Postoffice. It was written on a small piece of white paper in red ink. The writing was almost illegible. A copy of the letter follows:

"Dr. Davis—You are hereby notified that unless you quit your job within the next ten days we are going to tar and feather you.

"By order of the Ku-Klux Klan."

Director Davis remained in his office all day calmly attending to his duties. "I do not think anything about it," he said; "this is the third letter of this kind I have received since I have been in office; one was unsigned and the second was supposed to have come from the Black Hand. I paid no attention to the other two and I don't intend to think anything about this one. But if they come, I am ready for them," the director concluded as he brandished an automatic pistol.

When the news of the letter spread

through the office many of the women employees became alarmed, but resumed their duties after being quieted by agents. The director said he did not think enough of the letter to turn it over to the police.
