

## CROP FAILURE UNLESS RAIN COMES SOON

Eastern Indiana Fields Show  
Serious Need of Heavy  
Downpour.

## POTATO LOSS IS COMPLETE

Oats Stalks, Now Heading,  
Will Be Harvested by Use  
of Mowers.

MUNCIE, Ind., June 28.—Unless a long and heavy rainfall comes within the next few days, both the corn and oats crops in Eastern Indiana will be a failure this year, Delaware County farmers said today.

The potato crop is almost a complete loss already, due to the most severe drought this section of the State has known in the last decade.

Oats stalks now heading are so short that harvesting will have to be done with mowers.

With the exception of two light showers, no rain has fallen in Delaware County during June.
