City Engineer Will Bring Suit Against Weber Milk Company.

DON'T KNOW WHAT KIND OF MONEY IS NEEDED

Jameson Unable to Specify Car Company's Longings.

Henry Jameson said today he was not prepared to say anything about what kind of financial relief the Indianapolis Street Railway Company needs. He is chairman of the committee.

Mayor Shank several days ago said "inside information" the company wishes a 6-cent fare and 2-cent transfer charge. Present rate is 5-cent fare and 2-cent transfer. The company officials said the fare was up to Dr. Jameson, who is out of the city. "I really am not familiar enough with what has happened while I was away," said Dr. Jameson. "I can't tell what we must have. All we want is enough to get the city improvements made. We're not asking for anything we do not need, but specifically I can't say what is necessary."

MANUFACTURERS MAKE TEST ON SCHOOL BIDS

Specifications for Local Work Is Written to Favor Outsiders.

Specifications for paint for the city's public schools probably will be changed as the result of strenuous protests by a number of Indianapolis manufacturers.

At a special meeting of the school board last night the Indianapolis manufacturers, headed by W. H. of the Sargent-Gerke Paint Company, insisted the specifications be changed under the direction of Walter Twine, the board's business manager, were favorable to certain manufacturers. He said he understood they had been written by a representative of the Hoadway Paint Company of Chicago, a bidder for the paint contract.

He believed the special paint contract was a recommendation that all bids received on 4,000 gallons of paint be rejected and new bids accepted after revised specifications.

\$2,500 OFFERED FOR SPRING ON PLEASANT RUN

Contractors to Receive Bonus for Finding Flowing Well.

'MORE FOR BEER OR WINE'

Park Board Increases Appropriations for Open Air Shows.

Pleasant Run will not dry up into a series of stinking frog ponds in the summer if a plan to discover flowing wells along the stream is successful. The board of park commissioners today authorized negotiation of a contract with Charles Krauss & Sons, 402 W. Pratt St., whereby the firm will get \$2,500 if it establishes at least one flowing well of not less than 100 gallons a minute capacity along the stream in the east part of the city and \$600 if it fails.

"If you strike beer or wine we'll give you more than that," Mayor Shank told the firm's representative. Appropriation for vaudeville specialists between acts at the municipal open-air theaters was increased from \$25 to \$100 a week.

John A. Howe, 4328 Washington Blvd., was appointed special policeman at the Garfield Park Theater. Salary, \$25 a week. Arthur D. Taylor was appointed to succeed David Jennings, clerk in the assessment bureau, who resigned.

The new resolution for extension of Pleasant Run Parkway, from Shelby to Prospects Sts., saving \$122,000 on acquisition of property under the original plan, was adopted.

HARDING MOVES TO BRING COAL STRIKE TO END

Fifty Leading Operators and Union Officers at White House Session.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—President Harding today called upon the striking miners and the coal operators of the country to resume mining operations at once and then adjust their differences in joint conferences.

Speaking before about fifty chiefs of the United Mine Workers of America and leading coal operators at the White House, the president issued an emphatic warning to the warring factions that unless the strike is soon terminated the federal government, in the public interest, will exert all its vast powers to force an ending of the walkout.

Harding also declared that a permanent solution of the frequent strikes in the industry must be found.

Operators and miners were assured by President Harding that during the conferences here they will be immune from prosecution under the anti-trust laws.

COUNTY SCHOOL FUND TO PASS HALF-MILLION MARK

Auditor Leo K. Fessler Gives Figures on Annual Settlement.

Marion County's annual school fund settlement will amount to \$584,912.05 this year, according to Leo K. Fessler. This is the first time the settlement has amounted to more than \$500,000.

Revenue on confiscated liquor and automobiles used in transporting liquor amounted to \$46,486, police and justice of the peace fines, \$75,567.55, and balance of the old settlement, \$464,858.50.

The quarterly report from the county clerk's office also has been received by Mr. Fessler. A total of \$12,507.71 was collected in the months of May and June. The largest item was clerk's costs, \$9,402.41. Sheriff's fees amounted to \$2,575.30.
