

KLAN BIG ISSUE BEFORE PRIMARY AS TEXAS VOTES

Prohibitionists No Longer Occupy Spotlight in Large State.

CULBERSON OUT FOR SENATE

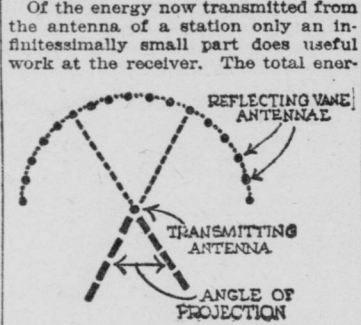
Five Others Asking Support of Democrats in First Sharp Issue.

DALLAS, Texas, July 22.—Beret of political battle—prohibition—Texas is taking its campaign stimulants from the Ku-Klux Klan and anti-Klan battle with a farm-labor coalition chaser. The issue will be partially settled at today's first 1922 Democratic primary. The lines have been closely drawn on this issue in the senatorial campaign, where six candidates are in the field. The two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will enter the

run-off primary, two weeks hence, unless the unexpected happens and one candidate records a majority of votes. In the gubernatorial race, where four names will appear on the ballot, the Klan does not seem to be so important a factor. Governor Neff is out for re-election. Harry T. Warner, Paris, newspaperman and avowed opponent of the Klan, has conducted a strenuous campaign through his paper, the Paris Morning News. Six Out for Senator Six candidates, including the venerable Senator himself, are seeking the toga of Charles A. Culbertson, which he has held for many years. Senator Culbertson announced early in his campaign that he was unalterably opposed to the Klan. Former Congressman Robert L. Henry of Waco declared he was a member of the organization and has solicited votes on that basis. Cullen F. Thomas, Dallas lawyer, said the Klan must die or else be re-organized along different lines. Mayfield a Klansman Earle B. Mayfield, Meridian, member of the Texas railway commission, has been recognized as one of the Klan adherents. Clarence Osuley, former assistant Secretary of Agriculture, has opposed the Klan. Former Governor James E. Ferguson, who was impeached, is the remaining candidate. He has strongly opposed the Klan.

RADIO REFLECTOR CONSUMES LESS ENERGY IN PROPORTION

There is little doubt that very small amounts of radio energy before long will enable the negotiation of great distances. Radio engineers are now working on the application of the radio reflector principle particularly for those stations which communicate over great distances. Of the energy now transmitted from the antenna of a station only an infinitesimally small part does useful work at the receiver. The total energy used is spread over a vast circular area. If it were possible to direct all the energy employed toward one definite point, a great reduction in the power required to reach a certain distance would be possible immediately. Transatlantic stations employ on

the average about 250 horsepower of energy. Marconi's reflector device is one way of solving this problem of energy wastes. Little Energy With a beautifully constructed model transmitting on a wave length of one meter he directed the course of the wave at will within a very small angle. Behind the transmitting antenna is placed a reflector of semi-circular shape. This reflector is composed of vanes, which are really antennae in themselves. These are spread exactly one wave length from the transmitting antenna. Energy thrown off from the transmitting antenna is absorbed by the wave antenna and is re-radiated. The energy which is thrown back toward the transmitting antenna is so timed, due to the spacing between the antenna and reflecting vane, that the radiation from the antenna is reinforced to a marked degree. Thus, the greater portion of the radiant energy is thrown in one direction. Stations using these methods are already in experimental operation abroad, and the way is pointed toward further possibilities for radio communication.
