More than five thousand followers of amateur baseball saw the third round of games in the Times Independent Tourney yesterday at Riverside diamonds, and they were rewarded by some of the best sandlot pastime seen in many moons. Starting at 12:30, the Riversides and Red Sox got into action to decide their second-round 1-to-1 tie played last Sunday. Frye for the Sox and Schmitz for the Riversides were again named for mound duty, and another pretty hurling duel was staged. Schmitz fanning fifteen batters and the veteran Frye turning back twelve. The hits were even—five apiece—but a little unsteadiness of the Red Sox finally decided the score, 3 to 1 in favor of the Riversides.

Riversides Lose

The Em-Roe No. 1 crew then hooked up with the Riversides in the Northwest Siders' second game of the day, which went to an 8-to-5 victory for the Em-Roes. Hackleman and Schmitz divided the pitching burden for Riverside, while Sagalowski went the route for the Em-Roes. The Em-Roes took an early lead when Hackleman's support cracked in several places, and, although Hack was pitching good ball, he was relieved after four innings by Schmitz in an effort to steady the team, Schmitz having pitched the last three previous games for Riverside. However, the Em-Roe lead was too big to overcome. A late rally in the ninth filled the bases with Riversiders, but there were two down, and "Sag" fanned the next batter. Longmeier of the Em-Roes starred at bat with a couple of two-baggers, and Miller of Riverside, in addition to a sparkling game in the field, slammed out a triple.

Olivers Forfeit

The Olivers failed to show for their postponed game with the Vonneguts, and the hardware boys were awarded the contest by Umpire Morrison, 9 to 0.

In their regular third-round game the Vonneguts "took" the Central A. C., 12 to 5, putting out some long hits, including two homers.

The Maywood Grays beat the State Independents, 24 to 6. Martin, Gray pitcher, being credited with seventeen strikeouts. White, McKeand, Hudson and McClung of the Grays got triples and their teammate Burk socked out a circuit drive.

O'Rourke pitched the Militaries to a 5-to-3 win over the Mapletons, striking out eight batters. "Huzzy" Harris got himself a nice three-bagger during the festivities.
